Memorandum re the Census of Free Baptists in New Brunswick, 1901.

The undersigned has the honor to lay before the Hon Minister of Agriculture a statement relating to the enumeration of a religious sect in New Brunswick known as Free Baptists at the taking of the census of 1901, and also relating to a discussion thereon in the House of Commons on 16th June ultimo.

1. The enumeration of the people by religions was provided for in the following instruction, being No 55 in the Book of Instructions for chief officers, commissioners and enumerators in taking the Fourth Census of Canada, 1901:

"The religion of each person will be entered according as he or she professes, specifying the church or denomination to which the person belongs or adheres, or which he or she favors. If the sons or daughters belong or adhere to or favor another church or denomination than that of their parents, or of either of them, the proper entry should be made; but except in such cases they should be classed with their parents. The classification of the people by their religious faith must not ignore any church, or denomination, or form of belief, saving in the case of a church or denomination whose identity has been lost by union or otherwise. There is no State Church in Canada, and if a person is not a member of one church or denomination, he must not be classed with one another. If he is an agnostic, or a non-believer, or a pagan, or a reincarnationist, or whatever his relationship to religion may be, he should be so classed."

No church or denomination was referred to in the instruction by name. One body ought not to be so specified without naming all; and the origin of some denominational bodies is so recent as to leave even their existence unknown except to specialists in the study of religions and religious nomenclature. But the undersigned was persuaded that the instruction was sufficiently definite for the purpose in view, and that in taking the census of the people by religions no existing body was likely to be overlooked.

The directions to enumerators that "the classification of the people by their religious faith must not ignore any church, or denomination, or form of belief" was emphasized in the Book of Instructions by black-letter print, and every enumerator was required to read and study the instructions carefully before commencing his work.

2. The first complaint against the accuracy of the enumeration of Free Baptists in New Brunswick was received from Rev Joseph McLeod of Fredericton in that Province, who described himself as corresponding secretary of the Free Baptist Conference of New Brunswick. The accuracy of the census of the same body in the adjacent Province of Nova Scotia was not questioned by anyone as far as known to the undersigned, and of the whole number of about 160 religious sects in Canada recorded by enumerators, the Free Baptist sect in New Brunswick is the only one on whose behalf the count has been challenged.

Referring to Bulletin No 5 of the census of 1901 Dr McLeod stated in a letter to the undersigned (1) that he found Baptists (Free Will) to number only 24,229— "a falling off of 20,887 since 1891," (2) that there is no body of Christians in Canada known as Free Will Baptists, but that there is a denomination whose corporate name is Free Baptist, and (3) that the figures announced in the Bulletin for New Brunswick Free Baptists were certainly wrong as "the reports from churches in 1890 the last year of the decade with which the census deals—gave us a church membership of 12,352 in this province."

3. The statement of Dr McLeod assumed that all persons classed as Free Will Baptists in the census of 1901 were properly Free Baptists, and therefore the large apparent decrease shown by the census of 1901 demanded careful revision of the work in the office.

The records of the numerous Baptist sects in New Brunswick were again compiled from the schedules, when it was discovered that in three instances mistakes had been made in grouping the bodies for the final table.

The result however affected in the aggregate only 502 persons—Old Baptists, Orserite Baptists and Free Christian Baptists—and no reasonable explanation was afforded by this revision for the seemingly large decrease in the number of Free Baptists during the decade.

4. In the course of further investigation the New Brunswick schedules of the census of 1891 were examined, and a compilation of the 15 different Baptist bodies recorded in them exposed the unfounded nature of Dr McLeod's claim for the Free Baptists.

The new compilation showed that 24,574 persons under the heading of Free Will Baptists in volume I of the

census of 1891 comprised four different sects, namely, Free Will, Free Christian, Reformed and Free Baptists, each of which had a distinct and separate organization.

The Free Will Baptist denomination is the oldest of these bodies, and in all censuses since Confederation until the last one it was given a separate column in the tables.

The Free Christian Baptist denomination became known by that name in New Brunswick in 1847, and was incorporated by an act of the Legislature in 1854. In 1898 the name was changed to Free Baptist by an amending act, and in 1901 for the first time it was given a place in the Dominion census.

The body described as Free Baptist in the census schedules of 1891 was organized nearly 20 years before by secession from the Free Christian Baptists. But the latter body seized the Free Baptist name in 1898, and in the same session of the Legislature the old Free Baptist churches were incorporated under the name of Primitive Baptists.

The fourth body grouped under the head of Free Will Baptists in the census of 1891 was described in the schedules as Reformed Baptist. The churches or congregations comprising it had been expelled from the Free Christian Baptist Conference for heresy, and in 1894 they acquired incorporation from the Dominion Parliament under the name of the Alliance of the Reformed Baptist Church of Canada.

The four religious bodies here described were grouped in volume I of the census of 1891 under the name of Free Will Baptists, embracing for New Brunswick a total population of 24,674, and to this number Rev Dr McLeod has laid claim, as constituting solely his own denomination, in the effort to discredit the enumeration of Free Baptists in 1901.

5. A full statement of the results of the foregoing investigation was prepared and sent to Dr McLeod officially as corresponding secretary of the Free Baptist Conference of New Brunswick; and figures of the new and revised compilations were given to show that while the actual number of Free Christian Baptists according to the census schedules of (Continued on third page.)
