(Continued from second page.) 1891 was only 10,672, the number under of Free Baptists according to the census of 1901 was 16,105, being an crease in the decade of 50 per cent. The statement also drew attention to the fcat that 1,338 of the 16,105 persons counted as Free Baptists had been recorded in the schedules as F C Baptists, although the act which changed the name of that body was passed three years before the census

6. The reception of this statement at the hands of Dr McLeod, the undersigned ventures to say, was most unusual. Although addressed to Dr Under the Management of Gallagher Bros McLeod as corresponding secretary of the Free Boptist Conference of New Brunswick, extracts were made from it for publication and comment in a religious paper of which Dr Mc-Leod is the editor, and week after week it coctinued to be a subject of

> It was "unmitigated audacity" to attempt to show from the enumeration of 1891, the paper said, that Dr McLeod had made the mistake of assuming that all persons classed as Free Will Baptists were of his own

The statement showing that instead of the Free Baptists of New Brunswick numbering 24,674 in 1891 they only numbered 10,672, Dr Mc-Leod the editor said, meant that "Mr Blue instead of correcting the outrageous blunders of his own census has changed the figures of the census of 1891 to suit his purposea census taken ten years before he began his play of mixing and muddling census figures."

"It remained for Mr Blue to declare that we had not at that time (1891) half as many people as the census said.
