recorded in the Lincoln parish sched-
ules it is obvious also that they did
not disappear in the Ottawa compila-
tion.

The enumerator (W. H. Steeves) has
given his own version of the matter
in the following letter to the under-
signed under date of 25th May 1904:

"Your favor of the 16th inst re-
census inquiries to hand. Dr. McLeod
wrote some time since I was census
enumerator for the County of Sun-
bury; if so did I return any Free
Baptists in my lists; that there was
none in the report from Ottawa.

I made a copy of the reply to his
letter, which I am sorry to say has
got mislaid. I wrote him in reply as
near as I could remember, that I was
enumerator for the parish for Lin-
coln only, that I could not remember
if there were any Free Baptists re-
corded in my return, but I felt con-
fident that whatever they gave me as
their denominational leanings I re-
turned them as such. I will say
here if the people claiming to be Free
Baptists had said so at the time I
should certainly have recorded them
as such and they would appear on
the schedules the same."

This account agrees fairly well
with the extract from Mr. Steeves'
letter published by Dr. McLeod, and
it furnishes strong proof that the
editor had no authority from the enu-
merator to assert that though the
Free Baptists of Lincoln were re-
ported "they all disappeared in the
Ottawa compilation."

One more paragraph is quoted
from Dr. McLeod's paper after he had
received the statement from the enu-
merator, which is a summing up of
his accusations:

"Mr. Blue's census, in so far as it
relates to the Free Baptists, abounds
in falsehoods. We called them
errors at first. We believed that they
were unintentional. We thought
they would be corrected when point-
ed out. They have been pointed
out. They have been proven so
clearly that a fool could not fail to
see them. They have not been cor-
rected. There is an evident deter-
mination not to correct them. They
are now nothing but falsehoods—
deliberate, wilful falsehoods. And
we charge Mr. Blue with the respon-
sibility of them."

7. The undersigned had no other
aim as Commissioner of the Census
than to carry through the undertak-
ing speedily, accurately and honest-
ly. So far from being possessed by
bias of any sort in the enumeration
of Baptists in New Brunswick or
elsewhere, he confesses that until
the census was taken he did not
know that a religious body bearing
the name of Free Baptist had exist-
ence.

But as soon as Dr. McLeod's protest
was received diligent inquiry began
to be made, and without assistance
or suggestion from him which his
knowledge of the history or records
of his denomination should readily
enable him to give, what at first
sight seemed like a gross injustice
to Free Baptists was made manifest.

The origin of the error was dis-
covered in the assumption by Dr.
McLeod that Free Will Baptists in
the census of 1891 meant his own de-
nomination only; whereas the in-
quiry has shown that four denomina-
tions, each with their creeds and
organizations apart, were counted
under that name.

Dr. McLeod has condemned the re-
sult in words and terms which be-
speak the sanity of his judgment;
and in the opinion of the undersigned
the inquiry in so far as Dr. McLeod
is concerned should be considered
as closed.

8. The discussion in the House of
Commons on 16th June had the result
of giving more definite form to the
question of the enumeration of Free
Baptists in New Brunswick.

Did the enumerator observe the
terms of the instruction for record-
ing the religions of the people, or
did they in any case or to any extent
fail to enter the religion of each per-
son according as he or she profess-
ed? Did they ignore any church,
or denomination, or form of belief
in the classification of the people by
their religious? Mr. Fowler instanc-
ed the parish of Kars in King's
County and Mr. Wilmot the parish

of Lincoln in Sunbury County as
localities in which such mistakes
were committed by enumerators.

9. In the parish of Kars, Mr. Fow-
ler said, there are no persons given
as Free Baptists in the census al-
though there are two churches of
the denomination there. These peo-
ple know the sharp distinction be-
tween the Free Baptist denomination
and the Baptist denomination, he
declared, for the two bodies are as
distinct as Methodist and Presby-
terians. "The difficulty arose out of
the ignorance of the enumerators
that were appointed. These people
of course gave themselves as Free
Baptists, but the enumerators did
not think it made any difference and
they put them down as Baptists." In
support of this statement Mr. Fowler
quoted a letter from Dr. McLeod
saying:—

"I have had correspondence with
Mr. M. Jenkins, the Kars enumerator,
and he tells me that he entered all
Free Baptists as Baptists."

"He does not claim," Mr. Fowler
went on to say, that these people
represented themselves as Baptists,
but he says he entered all Free
Baptists as Baptists, which was
clearly a wrong because it was his
duty to enter these people as they
called themselves. I have no doubt
the enumerators of the City of St.
John have done exactly the same
thing." And later in the debate Mr.
Fowler said: "The same thing oc-
curred in St. John."

10. In the parish of Lincoln Mr.
Wilmot said said to be believed 70 per
cent of the people belonged to the
Free Baptist body, and from the
best authority he could get they had
not been classified as Free Baptists.
Mr. Wilmot did not think that any
wilful wrong had been done in the
matter, but a mistake had evidently
been committed. "From the infor-
mation I can gather the enumerators
went through their districts and
asked the religious denomination of
the people, whether they were Free
Baptists, or Close Communion Bap-
tists, or any other kind of Baptists,
but they did not classify them and
they put them all down as Baptists." Mr.
Fowler however did not agree
with Mr. Wilmot that no wilful
wrong had been done. "It is my
opinion," he said, speaking after
Mr. Wilmot, "that the error on the
part of the enumerators was both
deliberate and wilful and that they
should be very severely reprimand-
ed by the Hon. Minister."

11. The charges concerning the
conduct of the enumerators for Kars
and Lincoln, the undersigned thinks,
deserve to be thoroughly investi-
gated, for if the facts are as alleged
in the House of Commons the enu-
merators were guilty of violation of
the instruction for taking the relig-
ions of the people,—apart from any
consideration of carelessness and in-
difference as intimated by Mr. Wil-
mot, or of ignorance and malice as
averred by Mr. Fowler.

But the accused ought not to be
condemned unheard. They are en-
titled to a fair hearing, and the in-
quiry should be undertaken by a
competent man having authority to
send for persons and papers and to
take evidence upon oath.

Mr. Jenkins, the enumerator for
Kars, has written to the undersigned
a stout denial of Mr. Fowler's accusa-
tion. A copy of the debate of 16th
June having been sent to him, Mr.
Jenkins wrote on the 22nd July:—

"I am in receipt of your favor of
the 9th inst. in re the census, and in
reply would say that in recording
the religious faith or church de-
nomination of the different persons
in this parish I set opposite each
name the answers as I received them
at the time, notwithstanding Mr.
Fowler says otherwise, which is not
true. And also when he says I re-
fused to rectify the record is another
error, as no one ever asked me to
make any change. I don't remem-
ber of anyone answering anything
different, but just as I have entered
on the schedule; and whether they
were Baptist, Free Baptist or Church
of England, or Roman Catholic, I
did not consider it any of my busi-
ness, I put down the answers as I re-
ceived them at the very time I took
the censuses.
