The Carleton County Exhibition  
a Magnificent Success.

For many years the Carleton County Exhibition has been known as one of the best agricultural and industrial fairs in the maritime provinces. Each succeeding show has been an improvement on its predecessors, and this year proved no exception. The entries were more numerous, the exhibits more extensive, and we believe the attendance greater, than on any previous occasion. The weather conditions were favorable and everything passed off in the best possible manner. Tuesday morning was largely spent in getting the exhibits in shape, and at two o'clock the formal opening took place. President Briggs was in the chair, and made a brief address. He was followed by Mayor Lindsay, fresh from the great fair at St. Louis, who in a few well chosen and eloquent remarks extended a hearty welcome to the visitors. Hon. L. P. Farris, commissioner of Agriculture was introduced, and made a short but practical speech. He congratulated the County on the magnificent showing it was making. The exhibits were as fine as any he had yet seen. If any word of criticism might be said, it was that very few samples of the more hardy varieties of apples were shown. He felt that greater effort should be made to produce winter apples. The stock exhibit was highly commended. He had great pleasure in declaring the exhibition formally open. Delightful music was furnished by the fine band of the 6th Regt. In the space at our disposal this week it would be impossible to give an adequate write up of anything like half the splendid exhibits. We shall devote what space we have to some, and the others will be fully told of in our next issue together with the prize list, which of course was not fully made up at the hour of going to press.

Upon entering the main building one is greatly impressed with the fine exhibits. E. W. Mair had a splendid and highly attractive corner booth, where the celebrated Clydesdale stock foods were shown. The energy of Mr. Mair is sure to cause a boom in anything he undertakes to handle, and stockmen and others are sure to derive benefit from feeding their animals with Clydesdale goods.

The W. H. Johnson Co's piano exhibit.—The most costly and artistic exhibit was that of the W. H. Johnson Co. of Halifax and St. John, and consisted of an assortment of pianos from the best makers to be found and were a credit to Mr. Allen the firm's representative who made the selections for the fair here.

Two boudoir grand pianos by Gerhard-Heintzman were admired the

most. One was in a french burl and the other in a beautiful Russian blistered walnut case. The Struggle May be Near.

Although the exact date has not been announced, and even no formal vote of the cabinet has been taken on the question of an appeal to the country, it is generally admitted that the elections are likely to come off this fall. The prospects for a magnificent liberal triumph are bright. Fortune has largely favored the administration, and it would seem as if the people will grant Sir Wilfrid Laurier a further tenure of office. It must not be taken for granted that the opposition will put up a mere show of resistance. The conservative party will make a desperate struggle to gain possession of the loaves and fishes. It was, if we remember rightly, Sir Richard Cartwright who on one occasion remarked that "a tory relieved of office is more fierce than a she bear robbed of her cubs." Mr. Borden is making a strong bid for power, but the chances are against him. While there is not the slightest danger of his success it will not do for liberals to underestimate their opponents. This province should give a good majority in favor of the administra-

tion if harmony and effective organization prevail. The ridings where the fight will be close and somewhat doubtful seem to include Kings-Albert, Sunbury-Queens, the two St. John seats and probably Charlotte. In the others government success is much more than probable. In St. John the contest will be bitter. Dr. Daniel and his colleague, whoever the latter may be, will have their work cut out for them. It is unfortunate that slight dissensions may have existed there in the liberal ranks, but the nomination of Mr. Richard O'Brien, a popular and able gentleman, which is looked upon as a certainty, should heal all differences, and with a united front a notable triumph for liberalism will result in the metropolis of our province. To all friends of the party we would say "prepare for action."
