### NOMINATION PROCEEDINGS.

Carvell and Hale are the Candidates.

The nomination proceedings before Returning Officer Hayward were held yesterday afternoon. As was of course known before hand by everybody, Frank B. Carvell of Woodstock, and Frederick Harding Hale were placed in the field by their respective parties. Speeches were made by the candidates. We will give an extended account of the proceedings in our next issue. The crowd was seemingly strongly in favor of Mr. Carvell, who made a telling address.

### BORDEN'S MEETING.

Robert Laird Borden, titular leader of the conservatives party, addressed a very large audience in the opera on Thursday evening. Many were present merely from curiosity. Fully two thirds of the large number in the hall consisted of ladies and liberals, small boys and strangers. Of course Mr. Borden spoke well from his standpoint although nothing new was said. There was little or no enthusiasm. Those who had come from a distance were loud in their protestations of disappointment. Mr. Borden is no orator. He spoke nearly two hours, making a mild and somewhat ineffectual criticism of the government. Come again Mr. Borden, your good looks and genial ways commend you, but your political sayings are absolutely of no effect.

### A SOUND FISCAL POLICY.

There are still some Conservative journals and Conservative speakers mystified at the claim that the Liberal tariff policy increased the revenue while decreasing public burdens. That the burdens of government have been lightened is shown in a score of ways. Every branch of trade and industry has enjoyed an era of prosperity. An exodus has been changed to a growing tide of immigration, and the stories of depression have given place to universal satisfaction in the growing time. At the same time the increased revenue from a lowered tariff is shown by the more definite proof of official statistics. The matter is capable of a simple explanation. There is a point of greatest revenue for the burden imposed in every tariff, and any departure from it, up or down, lessens revenue. A tariff may be so high that it will yield absolutely no returns to the public treasury. If the burden it imposes is sufficient to absolutely prohibit imports it can yield no revenue whatever. When there is no trade there can be no taxation levied on it.

### HYMENEAL.

The residence of the groom was the scene of a quiet but interesting wedding on Thursday, Oct. 20th, when Isaac White of Gavelton, N.S., and Lily C. Goudy of Lynn, Mass., were united in holy wedlock by Rev. J.M. Mallory, assisted by Rev. D.E. Brooks, in the presence of twenty five guests.

After the ceremony the company repaired to the dining room where a sumptuous repast awaited them of which all participated with zest. A number of beautiful as well as useful presents were in evidence.

After a social time enjoyed by all the party dispersed leaving behind their best wishes for the happy couple, who will reside at Gavelton, N.S.

### POLITICAL POINTERS.

Mr. Hale has been tried and found wanting in usefulness. It is time for a change in Carleton County.

The struggle across the line is drawing to a close. Roosevelt will be a winner, but the house is apt to go democratic.

Liberals should read the new St. John daily called *The Liberal News*. It is ably edited, bright and newsy and is on the right side.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier has been making a tour of Ontario. Out of the 86 seats in that province the premier expects no less than 50 liberals.

A red hot Tory from Charlotte was in town yesterday, and admitted that Ganong was scared out of his wits at the fight Gillmor is putting up.

Carvell is the abler man of the two who on Nov. 3 will ask for the votes of the people of Carleton. He represents the wiser policy. The issue is clear.

The Tories in St. John are boasting of a great victory in store for Daniel and Stockton. The liberals are not saying much, but are sawing wood all the time.

It is said that Mr. Borden when here renewed the promise of a senatorship to the party who in 1900 had visions of a seat in the red chamber dangling before him.

Should Mr. Borden be defeated in Halifax, as seems probable, Billy McLean of the *Toronto World* will likely demand the leadership of the opposition, if he can get re-elected.

There is not a single scandal that can be charged against the liberal government. Think of it, and contrast the situation to-day with the case when the conservatives were in power.

Mr. Voter would you like to see another railway running down the St. John Valley? You know what it would mean to you. Mr. Hale is opposed to the new transcontinental in our province.

This is a secret ballot contest. Electors, do not be deceived by the Tory agents who are trying to purchase your birthright. If you take the Tory money, vote for the Liberal candidate, and thus help to undo the wrong.

Laurier has given eight years of clean, progressive and honest administration. No person can truthfully charge him with anything wrong. The government is pure and upright. It deserves success.

The fact is not seriously disputed that Laurier is sure of receiving another term in office. For gracious sake let Carleton County swing in line with the powers that be and send a supporter of the liberal government.

The liberals in this county are thoroughly united, and marching on to certain victory. Not a man of the least influence whatever who supported Carvell in 1900 is now on the other side. On the contrary scores of men who in the last fight were in favor of Hale are now in the thick of the contest opposing him tooth and nail.

Mr. Hale is getting desperate. His lawsuit against *The Times* is the act of a man in the last ditch.

We know of one former liberal in the town of Woodstock who is today a conservative. He was brought with a price, and a pretty big one at that.

Hon. A. S. White has Mr. George W. Fowler completely at his mercy in Kings-Albert. Advice from that riding are to the effect that White will win in Kings by 200 and in Albert by practically as many.

The Tories in town admit they are beaten on the merits of the contest, and are relying upon boodles. They think they can debauch the electorate by the shamefaced use of money in the manner such as only their heelers are capable of doing.

The *Press* intimates that public tenders were not asked for the construction of the armory. One notice was given in *The Dispatch* and *Sentinel* not to mention other papers. The *Press* never knows anything anyway. Look up the papers and see the ads for yourselves.

Mr. Hale's henchmen are telling people in the county that he intends moving to Carleton Co. in the spring. Mr. Hale has recently spoken twice in Woodstock, but has yet given no intimation of any such intention, neither has such a statement appeared in the *Press*. Mr. Hale is a non-resident and will remain as such.

Mr. Hale's organ, *The Press*, threatens a fearful lawsuit against *The Liberal News*, and the author of a communication in that paper. Poor Mr. Hale. Everybody knows he is cross and annoyed. He will get all that's coming to him if he proceeds with the suit, which everyone knows he dare not.

Electors of Carleton County, keep this in your memory:—In eight years of liberal rule not a single dollar has been added to the public debt; in the preceding eighteen years of Tory rule the debt was increased nearly fourteen millions each year. Will you vote the economical party out of power in order to let the spendthrifts in?

The Chee Foo Liar, whose location for some weeks has been a matter of doubt owing to the sudden cessation of news from his original base, has at length been discovered. From the sweeping character of the election forecasts in Tory papers, and the altogether one-sided reports of certain political gatherings, we would infer that the celebrated Chinese prevaricator has been imported into Canada, and is now with the number who are "behind Mr. Borden."

The *Press* is desperate. It says conservatives have been disfranchised through contemptible tactics. The *Press* knows the reason why certain names did not get on the list. It is simply because the men who were representing the parties did not know the law, and allowed themselves to be put out of court. The law says the sheriff has no jurisdiction to add names within the ten days previous to the date of election. The names were not put on because application was made too late.

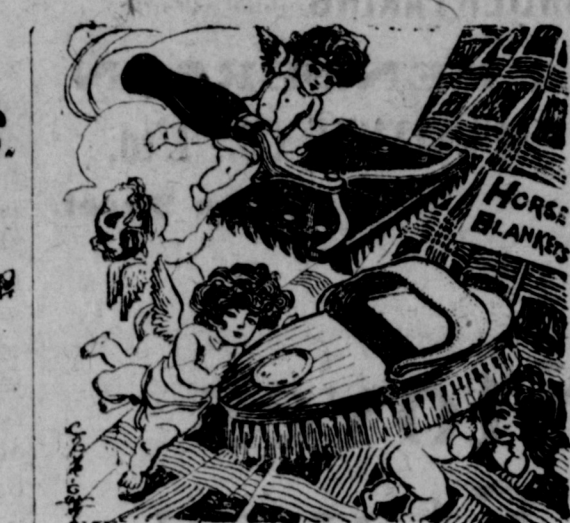
In conclusion, gentlemen, let me say this is a chance of a lifetime for some good healthy young man to make his mark. A fine farm well watered and wooded.
