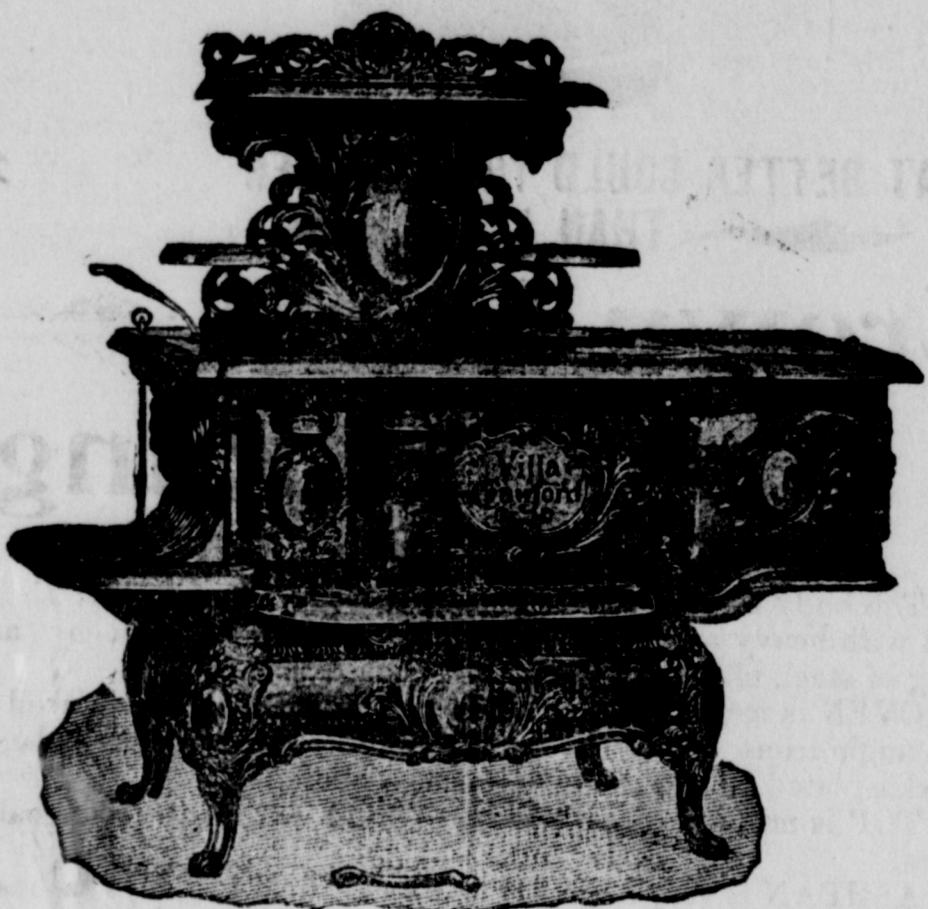

HORSE NOTES.

The Wilkes stallion Red Glen, record 2.40 in a walkover, could have stepped in 2.20 easily, trial 2.27 (one quarter in 33 seconds) seventh time hooked to a sulky.

In color is a beautiful mahogany bay, stands sixteen hands high and weighs 1150 lbs.

In power of breeding and individuality, he ranks well among the great speed producing sons of the mighty Red Wilkes.

Smallpox vs. Vaccination.

To the Editor of Carleton Sentinel:—

As I was looking over the SENTINEL of the 12th ult, I noticed a discussion by the Victoria County council on the smallpox vs vaccination question. I was thinking that on a matter of such vast importance and proportionate magnitude upon which the public mind is now agitated that not only doctors and the few favoured ones but, as doctors differ, the masses should be informed as well of the characteristic phases of epidemic smallpox, the press kindly lending its aid (which is the light of the world).

Questions of special interest: What is the prophylactic virtue of vaccine virus or in other words to what extent will it protect from the contagion of smallpox and by whom was it discovered? Has statistical record borne out the fact that vaccination with the cowpox is a protection against the contagion of smallpox? From what source is

the vaccine procured? How long does vaccination protect against smallpox? At what stage of smallpox is it most communicable to a person? How can the eruption of smallpox be distinguished from cowpox or the sores produced by vaccination? What is the period of incubation of the cowpox or vaccine virus? How many deaths from smallpox in the province in the last year? How many deaths from vaccination in the last year? Why do doctors disagree on the question of vaccination? Is humanized lymph liable to carry impurities and cause erysipelas and other blood diseases? Is bovine lymph apt to cause local inflammation, abscess, etc?

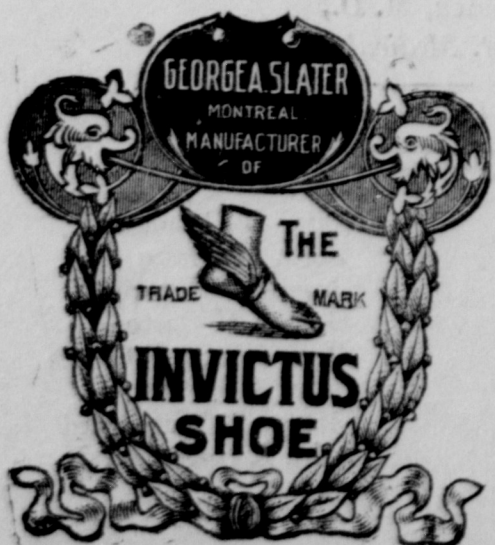
