

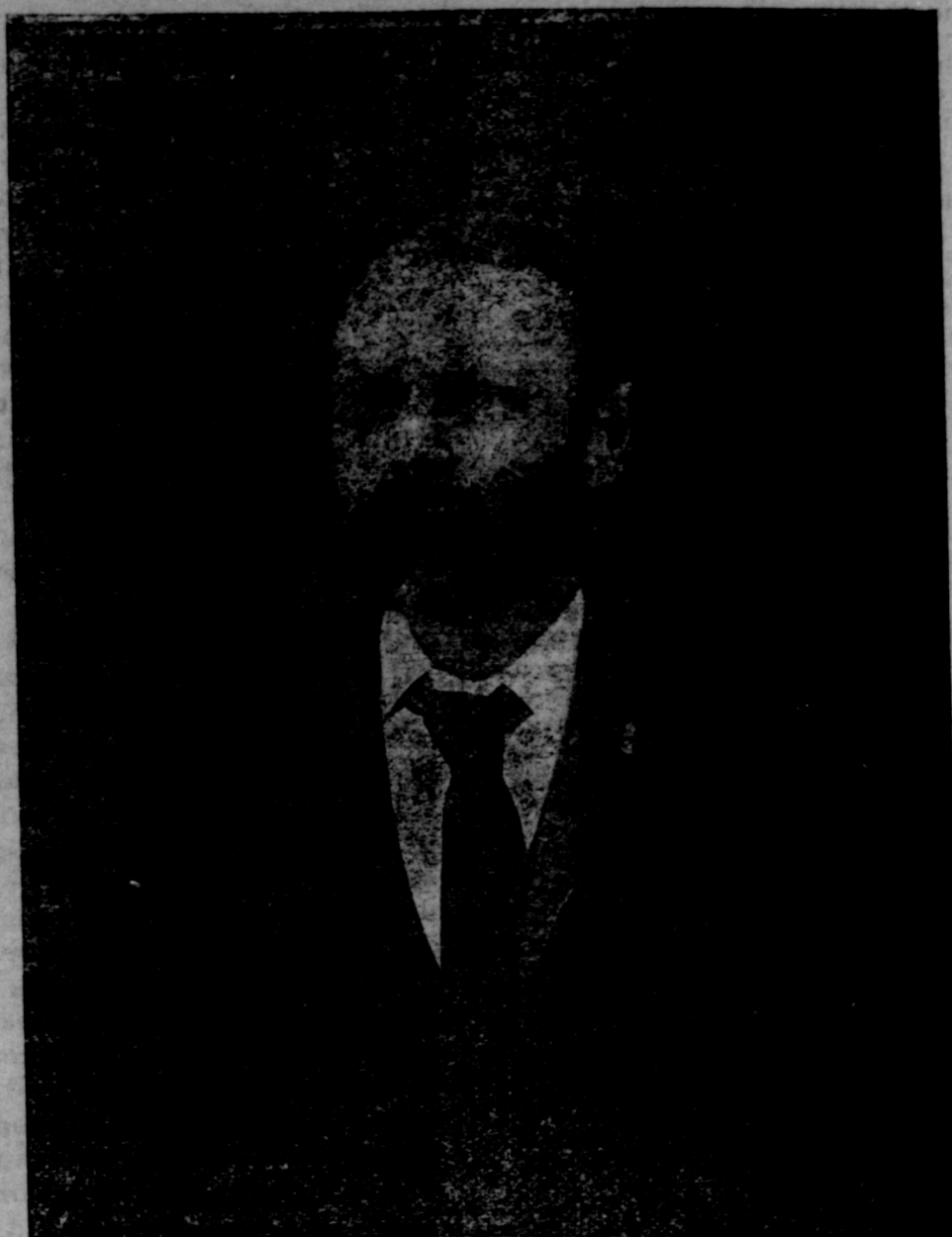

### Victoria County Council.

The first session of the newly elected council for the municipality of Victoria, opened in the Court House, Andover, Tuesday morning, the following councillors being present:—

Andover—J E Baxter, J W Howlett, Drummond—A J Jensen, D Mulherin, Gordon—John Ryan, E T Campbell, Grand Falls—J LeClair, O Mulherin, Lorne—James Jenkins, John Barker.

Perth—A Brymer, C R Inman. Warden Ryan was in the chair.

On motion Coun Baxter, seconded Coun Inman, the office of warden was tendered to Coun C Mulherin. On account of the fact that there is a petition against the election of Coun Mulherin, he declined the honor.

On motion Coun Brymer, seconded Coun Jenkins, Coun James W Howlett, Andover, was elected warden during the life of the council.

Petitions against the elections of Couns LeClair and Mulherin of Grand Falls and Coun Brymer of Perth, that they did by unlawful means, on Oct 20th, last, secure their elections, were referred to a committee of the whole to report at the earliest possible time.

Couns Ryan, Baxter and Barker were appointed a committee to confer with Messrs Correll and Malaney for the printing of the reports and shortly afterwards the committee reported that John P Malaney was recommended as the official reporter during the life of the council and the CARLETON SENTINEL was given the contract for printing the reports for two years, at the same rates paid that paper, for the past two years; Mr Correll was allowed \$15 for printing a synopsis of report for this session. The report of the committee was adopted.

The committee of the whole reported that while regretting that certain irregularities had crept into the recent election, there was no evidence that the councillors from Grand Falls were personally guilty of these irregularities, that the prayer of the petition be not complied with, and that Couns Mulherin and LeClair hold their seats. The report was adopted.

The petition against Coun Brymer will be dealt with on Wednesday. Sec-Treas Tibbitts reported that there was a balance on hand at last report of \$1472.07; receipts from all sources \$9195.44; total, \$10,667.51; expenditures, \$9747.47; balance on hand, \$920.04.

The auditor and board of health reports were submitted. A large amount of business is to be transacted, which will keep the council in session until Saturday afternoon.
