Enormous Sum of Money Expended for Liquor Last Year.

In the year 1903 there was poured down the throats of the public in Great Britain \$848,937,908 worth of alcoholic drinks. Nearly eight hundred and forty nine million dollars.

The money spent for liquor in Great Britain would have supported during the year 1,698,000 families, allowing \$500 to each family.

It would have given \$100 each to 8,490,000 boys and girls for the purpose of education.

It would have built 8,490 hospitals at \$100,000 each.

The things that might have been done with \$848,937,908 would make a list of indefinite length, but the fact remains that the vast sum went trickling down 42,000,000 or more throats to tickle the palates of the British people. If the harm which it did could be tabulated, the statistics would be even more astounding than the financial figures quoted.

A Chicago paper, commenting on these figures, says:—

"It is from such facts as these occasionally coming before us, that we gain fitting impressions of the tremendous folly of the drink habit. With \$848,937,908 diverted to legitimate channels of trade and to family necessities, poverty would be well-abolished in civilized countries, and the moral and physical standards would be revolutionized."

A Compromise Ministry.

A curious form of coalition and compromise is the basis of the new Australian Ministry. Although Mr G H Reid is the titular Premier, his is a divided sovereignty. In the negotiations which followed the defeat of the Watson Labor Government it was agreed that the portfolios should be divided equally between the Protectionists and Free Traders and that Sir George Turner, who was Sir Edmund Barton's and Mr Deakin's treasurer, should again take that portfolio upon the understanding that he should hold an equal position in the Ministry with Mr Reid. The memorandum of agreement between Mr Deakin and Mr Reid submitted to the meetings of their supporters laid it down that the tariff should not be altered in any respect during the present Parliament without the consent of both parties; that the fiscal issue should not be raised at any general election prior to the next ordinary general election; and that the policy of the Ministry upon all fiscal questions intended to be submitted at such election should be made public before May 1906. While it was recognized that no proposals affecting the trade relations of the Empire were probable from Great Britain during the present Commonwealth Parliament, there was nothing to prevent the acceptance of statutory concessions from other parts of the Empire. It was provided that steps should be taken in conjunction with the States to establish a uniform system of old age pensions throughout Australia, and other planks of the platform were almost identical with the policy of the Labor Premier, except the inclusion of State employees in the Arbitration Bill.—News.

It was difficult to believe at the outset that the School Children's Weed Competitions, inaugurated this year by the St John Exhibition Association would be anything like so enthusiastically taken up as it has been by both teachers and scholars. Scarcely had the announcement of these competitions been made than entries poured in from all parts of New Brunswick; and now the collections have commenced to arrive. The great taste with which these are got up cannot fail to convey a strong impression of the interest bestowed upon the competitions by the children. Dr James Fletcher, Dominion Entomologist and Botanist, will be one of the judges.
