#### The Circuit Court.

The fall term of the above court opened at Upper Woodstock on Tuesday with Judge McLeod presiding. The only case to come before the grand jury was one in which Harry Fisher, a 16 year old youth from Carlisle was charged with committing an indecent assault upon a young girl mamed Belyea. In this a true bill was reported. The prisoner was found guilty, with a recommendation to mercy. The judge gave him some good advice and sentenced him to jail for two months. Hon Wendell P Jones, Solicitor Gen- ! eral, represented the crown. TCL Ketchum appeared for the prisoner. The only remaining case, that wherein Annie H Tompkins sued Murray Ellis for breach of promise and seduction, claiming two thousand dollars damages, resulted in a verdict in favor of plaintiff for \$750. A child had been born to the plaintiff, and was produced in court. The Solicitor General appeared for the complainant, while the defendand was not represented by counsel. Proof was furnished of a pledge of marriage, and the jury made the finding as above reported.
