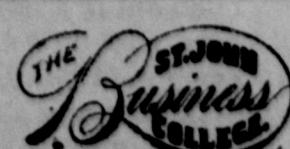

History of the War.

The New Brunswick office of the G T P now located in Fredericton, will be transferred to St John at the end of this month. The engineers, who are somewhat strongly in favor of the Central Route, do not find the Fredericton air quite suited to their health.

Life Insurance in Canada.

From the report of the Superintendent of Insurance, just received, we take the following interesting items concerning life insurance in Canada.

The business of life insurance in this country was transacted by forty active companies, of which twenty-one are Canadian, seven British and twelve American.

The total amount of policies in Canada taken during the year 1904 was \$98,306,102, which is greater than the amount taken in 1903 by \$6,736,297. The Canadian companies show an increase in 1904 of \$3,882,000, whilst in 1903 they had an increase of \$9,286,937; the American companies have an increase of \$2,878,414, whilst in 1903 they had an increase of \$1,919,315; and the British companies have a decrease of \$23,128 whilst in 1903 they had a decrease of \$191,413, the total increase in 1904 being \$6,736,297, as above stated.

The respective amounts effected are:—

Canadian Companies	\$59,061,113
British	3,109,778
American	36,145,211

So that the amount taken by native companies exceeds that taken by the British and American together by about \$19,800,000.

The total amount of insurance in force at the close of the statements was 587,860,790, which shows the large increase of \$39,437,790 over that of the previous year, being distributed as follows:—
