THE POSTAGE STAMPS AND THE SILVER STAMPS.

In the year 1847, during Com. Johnston's administration as Postmaster General, was issued the first postage stamp of the United States—the beginning of the great postal system of today. In the same year under the skillful eye of the original ROGERS BROTHERS was produced the first ELECTRO-PLATED SILVERWARE—the beginning of the famous

"Kicker" Heard From.

To the Editor of Carleton Sentinel:—

SIR:—As a ratepayer of the town I wish to get rid of a few ideas that have occurred to me recently and trust you will allow me the privilege of using a small amount of space in your paper. In the first place I want to make a decided kick, one of the regular mule variety, at Coun Leighton's course in the council last Friday night when he objected to paying the town delegates' expenses at \$60 each.

These gentlemen went to Ottawa, spent nearly five days, paid railway and hotel fares and the minor expenses we all know so necessary, and asked only \$60 each to reimburse themselves. In the first place it cost each about \$30 to pay railway and sleeping car expenses. Delegations do not put up at third rate hotels or boarding houses. It costs them all of five or six dollars a day. I consider that Coun Leighton made a mistake. The amount covers only act at expenses, without any allowance for lost time. None of the town delegates is out of a job. They each conduct a business and their time is worth considerable. I do not fancy that Coun Stevens and Fisher or even Coun Henderson would have made any objection had they been present. The news of Coun Leighton's action was sent to the outside papers and printed under big headlines giving the public at large the impression that the town of Woodstock was too mean to pay its delegates.

In the second place I may say I read with surprise in the Press on Monday that R. J. Lindsay and A. G. Bailey were re-appointed revisors, on the motion of this same Coun Leighton. Against these men I can have nothing to say personally but I do believe it would be late in the day when any tory town council would appoint two grits to make up the electoral lists. It seems to me as if things are going from bad to worse. You may, Mr. Editor, not agree with what I have written, but in justice to the scores who like myself disapprove of many things that have lately transpired I ask you to insert this article and subscribe myself, enclosing card,

PROVINCIAL POLITICS.

It is about as good as settled, in fact many believe the gentleman already has the appointment in his pocket, that George Robertson M. P. for St. John is to receive the appointment as registrar of probate, which will cause a vacancy in the legislature. For the seat which is about to be vacated there is likely to be the liveliest kind of a fight. On a similar occasion last winter Mr Hazen's forces managed to pull a victory out of the fire and sent Mr Maxwell to Fredericton. There is every reason for thinking they will endeavor to repeat the performance, but with what degree of success we are unable to judge. It is certain that a strong effort will be made by the government to hold the seat. The fight is apt to be one between the younger men. The government may put up Mr A. O. Skinner who so nearly beat Mr Maxwell, or it is probable in the event of his not desiring the honor that either Ald. Bullock or Ald. Frink may be named as liberal standard bearers. Failing any of these there is Mr Trueman, who would be an eligible candidate. On the other side it seems pretty generally felt that John E. Wilson is the man who could give the government forces the hardest fight. There are also Messrs Baxter, Tilley, Macrae and Price, young legal gentlemen, the latter the law partner of Dr Stockton M. P. Whichever is selected will get a big vote. Of course we cannot for the life of us see why St. John should desert the Tweedle government which has always used the city well and may be depended upon to continue to do so.

There is a rumor in circulation that the wise ones have already selected the opposition ticket for Carleton, although the general local election is at least a couple of years in the future. The rumor that the senior local member has had enough seems to be verified. Mr. Smith is of course anxious for more and would like to have a prominent up-river gentleman and a certain resident of Woodstock as his colleagues. Mr Simms, it will be noticed, receives scant consideration, which is really too bad in view of the great encouragement some of the machine men exhibited last February in regard to his candidature.

A Chance for Woodstock.

Fredericton papers profess to have grave doubts as to whether Messrs Donald Fraser & Sons will rebuild in that city. It seems that there is some trouble respecting sufficient fire protection. It would seem as if this is our opportunity. While no person here would lift a finger to hurt our sister town, if it be the case that the Messrs Fraser are unable to secure satisfactory arrangements with the Fredericton city council, why not have our Board of Trade or town council make an effort to secure this large and important industry. We have fire protection sufficient for a dozen mills, and can afford to offer satisfactory assurances to any desirable corporation. The experiment of bonusing was tried a few years ago, but no person to-day can be found who is able to show any good that has resulted thereby. As this is out of the question we must depend upon our natural advantages which are very considerable. We need more industries of the right kind, and to get them we should be willing to make known the fact that we have ample fire protection to offer any concern that may locate in this vicinity.

The "Press" and Mr Connell.

The Press, referring to our remarks of last week respecting a certain feature of the election trial says:—"The fact that Mr Connell did not ask Mr Simms if he took the bible does not prove that the petitioner was guilty. . . . Such an interrogation was too foolish for either side to ask, and it was not asked." Evidently the editorial writer and the news editor of our contemporary are not in tune. The facts are that Mr Connell recalled Mr Simms with the stated purpose of asking him the very question which the Press says was too foolish for either side to ask. Judge Barker ruled against this question being put, claiming that it was not a proper one on re-examination. Mr Connell seemed very anxious indeed to put this "foolish" question. The Press surely put its foot in the hole when it accused Mr Connell of doing that which is foolish.

Municipal Affairs.

The election for county councillors will be held on the second Tuesday in October. Here in Woodstock the three old members, McDonald, Bailey and Fewer, are as yet without any opponents although it is said a Scott Act ticket will be in the field. Over in Northampton Couns Brown and Phillips are expected to run again. Squire Betts of Pembroke and H W Rogers are mentioned as their probable opponents. W O Cluff and E Robinson have been urged to run but do not desire the honor. Messrs Bell and Hay may have an acclamation in Richmond if they wish to run again. Word comes from Wakefield that so far there is no opposition in sight to the old members. In Brighton we learn that many ratepayers desire Dr Curtis. In Wilmot Mr Clark of Centerville has a lot of friends. It is said that Coun Carvell will run once more but Coun Williams may retire on his honors.

The Golf Trip.

Clarence Sprague, J S Creighton, W R Jones, Dr Sprague, B M Macleod, R N Loane, Hon W P Jones, Geo Mitchell, H Paxton Baird, A C Calder, Dr Guy Smith, Geo Balmaln and N Foster Thorne were in St John on Saturday playing golf with the St John team composed of Geo McAvity, E F Jones, Harold Stetson, Dr Magee, J D Hazen, J L McAvity, Sheriff Ritchie, Thos Bell, L V Norman, C J Coster, A C Currie, W S Barker and Dr O J McCully. The St John men won the singles and the Woodstock players had the best of the foursomes. The St John club are princely entertainers and eclipsed all former records for hospitality.

Going Out of Racing.

Gallagher Bros' lease of the Woodstock Trotting Park expires this fall. It is said on pretty good authority that they will not seek a renewal. The racing game has not been a very profitable venture. Having disposed of Shamrock they are without any track performer, and feel that they may now lay the game aside and allow someone else to boom it here. Just what will be done is somewhat doubtful. It will be too bad if there be no racing here next year, but to tell the plain truth the citizens have not been any too keen in the past to show their appreciation of the really genuine efforts made by the track lessees to provide the best that was to be had.

Quebec to be Strengthened.

The Government has selected the site for the new battery that it intends erecting on the shore of the St. Lawrence below Quebec, and an Order-in-Council was passed in connection with the expropriation of the land that is required. The Work will begin very shortly and will be executed under the direct supervision of the Militia Department. The guns are already delivered and ready for mounting. They will stand on an elevation 150 feet above the river and are of sufficient range to command the stream at that point. The fortification will be two miles below the Lewis graving dock, that is about five miles down stream from Quebec.

Lord Dundonald recommended that long range guns be placed at Fort Howe and also at Navy Island, St John. As that city is not strictly speaking, a strategic point, it is more than likely the defences of Halifax, Quebec, Esquimalt and other more important bases will first be attended to.

Political Rumor.

Rumors are abroad that A. A. Wright, M. P., will resign his seat for South Renfrew, in the House of Commons, that he will be provided with an office, and that A. B. Aylesworth, K. C., the prospective Minister of Justice, will run as a Liberal candidate in South Renfrew. The Renfrewites are suggesting J. Lorne MacDougall, late Auditor-General, and the former member for the riding, as the Opposition candidate. The above, which is taken from the Montreal Witness, may not be strictly correct, but there is certainly something in the wind which will soon come to light. Mr Fitzpatrick is tired of politics, and Mr. Aylesworth will probably take his place.

Leaving Town.

F. D. Snider, proprietor of the I. X. L. Store, is about to close out and move to Chatham where he has made arrangements to go into business with R A Murdock. Mr Snider has here and in transit to Chatham a stock valued at about \$15,000. As it is almost too great a risk to ship crockery Mr. Snider has decided to dispose of his stock in that line commencing to-morrow (Saturday) afternoon and continuing each week day night until cleared out. Mr Snider tells us that there will be absolutely no reserve. Everything will go at what is offered.
