### "Victory" Souvenirs for Boys and Girls.

We notice in the old country that in some of the widely read Canadian Press it has got abroad that the dear old "Victory," of Nelson fame, has been entirely broken up. Fortunately this is not the case, and King Edward has preserved this historic and famous ship as the one floating monument of that great era of the sea, which ended in Trafalgar. After the accident which befel H. M. S. "Victory," the damaged parts were taken from her, and it is this material—oak and copper—which was given by the Lords of the Admiralty to the British and Foreign Sailors' Society. The Canadian boys and girls, old and young, can secure a Nelson Centenary Memento, actually containing copper from the "Victory," suitably inscribed Medal or Brooch, which will be a lasting and priceless Souvenir.

One dollar and upwards given or collected for the Nelson Centenary Memorial Fund, which is to help seamen in all parts of the world, will secure one of these.


