The Centreville Roller Mill is now doing excellent work, and although there were some four thousand bushels of wheat stored in the mill a few weeks since waiting to be ground, it is now almost clear again. Farmers from distant points should not have to wait long now, unless there is a wonderful rush for the capacity has increased so a grist of 40 or 50 bushels will only require about two hours in grinding. Since the mill has been re-clothed with finer silk it is showing high points of quality and efficiency. ## THE COUNTY COUNCIL.

(Continued.)

In the Cammack matter there is a charge of \$2 a day, has that been the usual charge?

Mr Woolverton—That does not include mileage; I was three days and a night (\$8).

Coun Jameson—Where did you arrest Shannon?

Mr Woolverton—He lives back of Bath, Moose mountain.

Coun Williams—Have you not put in any bill for mileage in connection with this bill?

Mr Woolverton—Not in that \$8. I put in a bill for \$5.50 for going up and arresting him, that includes mileage.

Coun Gallagher—It looks to me as if there was just three days' attendance.

Coun Tompkins—It looks as if you charged for taking care of the old man at the same time you were bringing Walter down to the goal.

Coun Power—I understand he charges his nights as days.

Coun McDonald moved seconded by Coun Brown that the bill be paid.

Coun Williams—The objection I made to the bill. I know it has been customary to pay the constable \$1 a day and mileage. I think Mr Woolverton has charged \$2 and \$2.50 and his mileage as well. I am willing to pay the legal bill.

Coun McDonald—I do not think he has charged anything out of the way. It is no soft duty looking after a murderer, and I know Mr Woolverton is not afraid to take his life in his hands. Bill ordered paid.

The auditor's report was taken up (It has already been published at the first of this report) Mr Vince in answer to some inquiries said the total bonded indebtedness was \$17,000.

Coun Williams—I am well pleased at the showing of the audit this year. The last few years the council has looked after collectors and there has not been such a large defaulters' list as a result. We have \$2000 less on the defaulters' list than last year. By a good effort I think we can wipe it out altogether.

On motion ordered that the auditor make a supplementary report in June.

Coun Williams—I move that a committee be appointed to settle what bills be paid without reference to the council.

Coun Raymond moved that the finance committee deal with any special cases.

The sec-treas pointed out that this would occasion much inconvenience.

Coun McDonald—There is the question of furnishing wood or coal for the goal. It is pretty hard to get a person to deliver wood or coal and wait six months for his pay.

On motion of Coun Tompkins the finance committee was appointed to meet with the sec-treas at the dinner hour and decide on what bills shall be paid without resolution of the council and report to the council.

Mr Rankin Brown was heard as to the proposition of Brown and Holyoke to lease the county lot. They proposed to use the place for band nights, and so forth when they proposed to sell ice-cream and other refreshments. We never considered the question of the merry-go-round.

Coun Gallagher—I would object to the merry-go-round.

Coun Brown moved that the lease be executed to Holyoke and Brown at \$35 per year, subject to the building committee. Motion seconded.

Coun Connolly—I have thought of this matter since it came up yesterday, and it is my opinion that for the sum of \$35 it would not be wise for this county to lease that ground.

It is right opposite the goal a place of confinement and imprisonment. In my opinion the prisoners should be put in a quiet place—a place of solitude where they can reflect on their past life.

Coun Brown—I do not agree with the councillor. I do not believe it would do any harm, and I think it is a good thing to have the band playing now and then. I know I go to town to hear it often. Some councillors who are very economical don't seem to be willing to make a dollar for the county when we can do it.

Coun Raymond—We have always allowed the band to play there and have a stand there. I do not see anything objectionable. I would not think a merry-go-round would be desirable. I move this matter be left to the building committee. Coun Jameson seconded the motion.

Coun Connolly—I do not see why this council should not decide this now; I think a majority of this board should say whether they want it rented or not.

Coun Bull—I am one of the building committee and I would think the council should settle this here. Last year I think the sheriff gave the merry go round permission to go in there himself.

Coun Giberson (Wicklow)—I think it should be settled by the council as a whole.

Coun Raymond—My object was in leaving it to the building committee, we would be under a certain expense unless the ground is leased.

Coun Tompkins—The building committee will still have some power.

Coun McDonald—A man was going to show on this ground last year and paid me \$10. He did not show. He then paid me \$5 as I asked him. I made up my mind not to lease it to any one, when the sheriff came to me and said a man with a merry-go-round wanted the lease, I understood the merry-go-round man paid him.

Coun Brown—Did he not get the grass cut and hauled and hand in a bill to you for the work?

Coun McDonald—It is in his bill.

Coun Williams—I am in favor of leaving it to the building committee.

Amendment lost and original motion carried.

Coun Williams—There seems to be a difference of opinion with regard to the committee appointed last night on Mr Brown's bill. I want to know if the councillors from Kent were included in that.

Coun Raymond—I included the councillors from Kent in the resolution.

Coun Tompkins—I inferred he only wanted the councillors to get certain information and then they would retire the same as Mr Brown.

The clerk read his minutes, and he had not in that the committee include the councillors from Kent. He suggested that the reporter read his notes.

The reporter read the resolution in which the councillors from Kent were included in the committee by the resolution.

Coun Brown moved the reconsideration of the matter.

Coun Gallagher—I do not think that the councillors from Kent wish to figure in the report at all. I won't sign my name to any report.

Coun Williams—Don't I understand you signed your name?

Coun Gallagher—I did not sign my name, I said I would agree to let it go.

Coun Bell (Richmond) I understand that you have been a different report but for the councillors from Kent, I think they would be biased.

Coun Williams—If the councillors from Kent don't consider themselves on the committee, it is not necessary to have another committee appointed.

Coun Brown's motion to reconsider being seconded was carried.

Coms Bradley, Raymond, Giberson (Kent) voting nay.

The minutes of the sec-treas as recorded by him was then approved by a vote of the council.

Coun Connolly on behalf of the committee appointed to consider the petition of the Canadian association for consumption and other forms of tuberculosis reported that they had looked over the petition carefully, noted the facts and recommend that if the association asks assistance from the provincial government, the council records itself as favorable to any aid the government might be willing or able to give.

On motion report received and sec-treas instructed to prepare a petition to be sent to the local government.

Following committees were appointed: Finance, Couns Williams, Bailey, A G Bell.

Sec. Act, Couns Bailey, Carvell and Phillips.

Building, Couns McDonald, Raymond, Smith.

These bills were dealt with.

The committee on the Scott Act Inspector's report, reported:

We beg leave to submit the following:

1st we find vouchers for amounts on bills correct as far as they go. We find inspector's salary charged \$390. It should be \$400 which would make the balance \$208.68 instead of \$208.68.

It appears to us that the act is run for revenue for some people but the county does not seem to get its share.

A G Bailey, H P Carvell, D Phillips.

Above is the report as finally adopted, the following in it as at first presented were stricken out after explanations from the inspectors: "Some of the vouchers are not signed by parties receiving the money. We find three vouchers of Mr Woodard signed with a mark, a fourth one with his name written in full. In the case of A P Wynnam we find one conviction for \$100 and costs charged to the county of \$153.00. This does not include P. M. or attorney fees. This being a conviction we cannot understand why the county should pay the costs for witness fees and services on the same."

Coun Power moved seconded by Coun Tompkins that the report be received.

Coun Bailey—I have been several times on this committee and this is the most complicated report we have ever had. It seems almost impossible to find out very much about it. We have one conviction for a second offence which was provided, I would like to know why he did not pay the costs, why the county has to pay the costs. Why did not Wynnam pay the costs when he was convicted, and if he did why did the county pay it again. It does not look to me as if the Scott Act was run to stop the sale of liquor. Before the separation of the town from the county, I prepared a statement and there were just 5 cases in the whole county outside the town, now we have far more convictions. There used to be two places between here and the boundary line, now there are four. This year there were 15 cases settled and costs were charged on these 15 cases. If the Inspector will do his duty I will stand by him. In a statement issued by the government containing the statistics on drunkenness we find that it is on the increase in the province of New Brunswick, and it is on the decrease in the province of Quebec. The Scott Act is evidently run for purpose of revenue and not to stop drunkenness.

Coun Raymond—Do we understand that the costs of the Whyman case were charged to the county when he was convicted?

Coun Bailey—It is the only case we can find against him.

Coun Tompkins—Did you not have the Inspector before you?

Coun Bailey—The Inspector is always here before the board, and we thought we might as well wait and make one job of it.

Coun Williams—I did not notice how many convictions were made against McMullen at the Boundary line.

Adjourned for recess.

After Dinner:

Coun Phillips of Peel. We could not reconcile the receipts with the payments there was this \$150.00 paid, Mr Colpitts acknowledged that Mr Wynnam paid the costs. My opinion is that the law should be carried out in its entirety. I have been called a rummy. There is not a member at the board who is more of a temperance man than I, as I do not know the taste of liquor. If the law was put into full force and the full penalty inflicted I think the sale of liquor could be stopped. In the case of McMullen the liquor was taken away from him, and the liquor was afterwards returned. I would like to know whether they would be allowed to destroy it or not.

Mr Hartley If a conviction is made for keeping for sale, they can destroy the liquor. If liquor was taken, without the officer having evidence, there might be an action against the county for illegal seizure.

Coun Carvell—I think this should not go by without my giving some reasons why I signed the report. Since I came here I have always supported the Scott Act. I understand the only time I did not was when he asked for an increase of salary last year. I felt he had sufficient salary. I am not satisfied the way the Act is run, while I am in sympathy with the Act, I have heard some things in connection with its enforcement about which I am not satisfied. 15 papers were served on Mr Perkins of Centreville and I notice a detective was paid \$85 for his services in a connection with the case. For some 7 cases at the line, he received \$53. This was paid to one, Thompson. Now, when the Inspector had his witnesses in the case of Mr Perkins and 15 papers why did they settle for \$150. There was \$133 went to the detective, \$10 to the police magistrate and \$10 to Mr Jones, the prosecuting attorney. Mr Perkins never was in Court, never saw a trial of any kind. They might have had a formal trial in order to make up the costs. I understand it was settled by some outside parties, and that Mr Perkins never settled with Mr Colpitts. It looks as if they were not running the Act in the interests of the Act, but in the interests of some persons. We find on the first of December by the report, \$50 charged against Mr Perkins with \$10 costs. Were any papers served on Mr Perkins on that case?

Mr Colpitts—I think not.

Coun Carvell—How did you get the costs if there was no paper served. Did you not write Mr Perkins that if he did not send you a certain amount of money you would prosecute him?

Mr Colpitts denied anything of that kind.

Coun Carvell—How did you come to get the money?
