EDITORIAL NOTES.

Here is a sample from the Press:—
"Albert Jones elected mayor—Oh, Lord!"
Comment is unnecessary.

The opposition organ having ably assisted in the political annihilation of Messrs Hale and Lindsay by giving them its support, seems to be after Coun Leighton's scalp. Any person incurring the enmity of the Press is to be congratulated.

"Citizen" that energetic writer who "butts in" whenever anything deemed highly important is to be circulated through the columns of the Press, says: "It would look as though the council proceedings would be worth watching during the next year." Why certainly, Mr Citizen, in striking contrast with councils that we have known. Live bodies are always worth watching.

The Press calls its venerable contemporary "the Silly Sentinel". We are certainly shocked at this breach of etiquette on the part of our courteous, refined and ably conducted neighbor.

Considering the amount of vexation they must necessarily have felt over the result of the town election the opposition organ's able outfit of officers, censors, etc are to be congratulated on the small amount of vapor emitted in their last issue. They may yet become quite reconciled to defeat.

The Press is almost profane in its wailing over the defeat of its president.

Lieut A W Fields evidently did good service on election day. Just as soon as a man shows ability his opponents jump on him.

The high journalistic tone reached by the Press in its discussion of political affairs resembles that of the Arizona Kicker in palmy frontier days.

A wondering public stands aghast at the amazing effrontery of the man who penned the classic sentence, "Albert Jones elected mayor, Oh Lord!" Just as if Mr Jones could be inferior to his predecessor or unworthy of the office. The people passed judgment on his fitness.

The little ring who stay awake nights trying to think up something unpleasant to say about Mr F B Carvell worked overtime last week. Their effusions in the last issue of the Press come about as near the level of skank journalism as anything we have yet seen. We do not fancy Mr Carvell will lose any sleep over what they say. He has his opponents down, good and hard, and they know and feel it.

Connell vs. C. P. R. Settled.

We understand the case of Connell vs C. P. R. has been settled. Our readers will recollect that some months ago the C. P. R. undertook certain repairs to the bridge across the Moduxnaheag. Mr. H. A. Connell claimed damages for trespass. After some exciting scenes bordering almost on frontier style the matter was referred to arbitration. Hearing of evidence was nearly finished when the arbitrators met here some weeks ago. Argument of counsel was to have taken place on Tuesday at St John, but Mr. J. C. Hartley and Mr. Connell went to that city on Saturday and arranged a settlement with the company. Mr. Connell accepted the sum of \$500 being the amount formally tendered him some months ago, and each party had to pay half the costs of arbitration, amounting to about \$1200. It will thus

be seen that it has been no Klondyke for either party especially when in addition to the above each side had to pay its own witness and counsel fees, probably in the vicinity of \$800 each. Mr. Connell's claim in the proceedings before the arbitration court was between three and four thousand dollars. Before the arbitrators were appointed the C. P. R. made a written offer of \$500, so the subsequent proceedings merely resulted in the payment of heavy expenses without gain by either party.

The Ontario Election.

In the Ontario local contest held on Wednesday the Ross government was routed,—horse, foot and artillery. The legislature contains 98 members, and in the new house about two thirds will be conservatives. The liberal party have been in power for nearly thirty three years—far too long for their own good and for the welfare of the province, if we believe half the stories their opponents tell. The fault was not so much with the leaders, but rather on account of the baronies and other unscrupulous heelers who attached themselves to the ministry for selfish purposes, and by their misdeeds brought the whole party into disgrace.

If for nothing else it is well that there be a change merely for the sake of it. A party in opposition for the third of a century deserves a term of office. Ontario liberals will profit by a term in opposition. Sir Wilfrid Laurier would have carried that province in the recent federal contest had it not been for the misdeeds of the local government heelers. In every constituency scores of liberals voted against their party. In future liberalism will be free from the evil associates who have brought discredit upon it. Our conservative friends will naturally be elated over the result in the premier province. They are welcome to the few crumbs of comfort that come their way. They will no doubt do a large amount of crowing, which under the circumstances will be excusable. The federal arena is still in undisputed possession of the liberal party, and will continue so. In the days when Ontario was most loyal to Mowatt, Sir John A Macdonald had no difficulty in securing a federal majority. Provincial and federal politics have seldom run in the same groove in that province.
