When Posing for a Photograph. When the average woman goes to have her photograph taken she wears the gown which she believes to be most becoming, and often is disappointed in the result.

To have it take well seems to be as desirable as to get a good likeness. Remember, then, that the success or failure of a photographer in securing a good picture depends largely on the sort of clothes worn by the person who is posing for a photograph.

For instance, a blouse of silk with a glistening or polished surface cannot be made to take well in a photograph, and will give a peculiar effect to it that nine out of ten women will not like; yet, when the fact is pointed out to them, they may refuse to believe it.

Another thing that does not lend itself well to photographic purposes when made up into garments is goods of a positive pattern, such as large plaids, wide stripes, and so forth. Dresses of these goods may look well on the wearer, and perhaps in a few cases not detract from the effect in a photograph, but as a general proposition they ought to be tabooed by women when having their pictures taken by any photographic process.

Sharp contrasts in pronounced colors ought also to be strictly avoided, and jet or other glistening or glittering jewellery should not be worn, for the light is reflected from them sometimes in such a way as to spoil almost completely the picture.
