EMMERSON IS O. K.

The Charlottetown Patriot says:—"The Moncton Times is extremely bitter in its denunciation of Hon. H. R. Emmerson, the Minister of Railways and Canals, and declares that he is 'bankrupt in reputation as well as brains.' Come to think of it, Mr. Emmerson has been a howling success for a 'brainless man.' He went up from a boy to a seat in the Legislative Council of New Brunswick. Afterwards he rose to be Minister of Public Works in the Province of New Brunswick. He was made Premier of that Province, and when he appealed to the electors of the Province on a straight party issue, he won with 'both hands down,' as the boys say. He resigned the Premiership, and defeated Mr. H. A. Powell, one of the most brilliant men in the Tory ranks. He was appointed Minister of Railways which the Tories all said he could never get, and at the last general election he went back to Westmorland and defeated Mr. Powell again and carried the Province. Men, 'bankrupt in brains' or without 'reputations' don't as a rule shine out and go to the front as Hon. H. R. Emmerson has done."

The Patriot quite correctly sizes up the situation. Hon. Mr. Emmerson has given the conservatives many a good lambasting and has the ability to repeat the performance. His record, outlined by the Patriot, speaks for itself.

### TOWN COUNCIL.

The town council met Monday evening. The only absentee was Coun Henderson.

The report of the Town Treasurer was received, showing the receipts and expenditures of the several departments of the Town of Woodstock for the six months ending June 30th, 1905. The statement showed expenditures amounting to \$11,641.72 with receipts amounting to \$6153.81.

The town treasurer's statement showing receipts and expenditures for the month ending June 30th, 1905, was also received. The month's expenditures amounted to \$2289.08 and the receipts to \$626.90. Among the latter was the sum of \$100 from Rev B Colpitts, Scott Act Inspector. The bank debit balance on June 30th had reached large and somewhat appalling proportions, \$10,103.88.

The council will meet again tonight. The wise ones predict an interesting session.

### Train Arrangement and Special Rates Woodstock Carnival, July 14 and 15.

For the above tickets will be on sale from all Atlantic Division Stations in New Brunswick, and from Vancouver and Arcoostook County stations in Maine for all trains July 13th and 14th and the a. m. trains of July 15th at single first class fare for the round trip good for return up to and including Monday, July 17th. In addition, special low rate of \$1.15 will be named from Fredericton and intermediate stations on the Gibson Branch to Woodstock July 14th, also special low rate of \$1.25 from St. Stephen by regular trains Friday, July 14th. On the same date an extra train will be run to leave Edmundston at 8 a. m.—Presque Isle 7 a. m., making all intermediate stops, reaching Woodstock about 10.45 a. m.—Special rate of \$1.90 from Edmundston and points on the Edmundston Branch, and rate of \$1.25 from Presque Isle, and points on the Presque Isle Branch. This train will also carry any regular business coming from points South of Arcoostook. On July 15th Plaster Rock train fifty seven will be held at Woodstock until 6.30 p. m., and will then run through to Plaster Rock, and will carry excursionists returning to Presque Isle, Edmundston and intermediate stations. An extra train will be run in connection with number fifty seven from Perth to Presque Isle and Edmundston; also on same date Gibson Branch train number forty one for Fredericton will be held until 7 p. m. to accommodate excursionists from Fredericton and points on the Gibson Branch. On Friday and Saturday, July 14th and 15th extra train will be run between Houlton and Woodstock to leave Houlton 7.00 p. m., each evening running through to Woodstock, returning will leave Woodstock 8.30 p. m. each evening. This special train arrangement, with the low rates named should insure a large attendance at the Carnival, especially as this is the large event of Carleton County this year, it having been decided that the Fall Fair will not be held at Woodstock this season.

Prominent Japs Who Are Presbyterians.

An exchange prints the following:—

"Admiral Togo is a member of the Presbyterian Church. Vice Admiral Uriu is a Presbyterian elder. General Serrata, the commander of the forces of Japan in her last war with China, was a Presbyterian elder, and up to the time of his death President of the Tokyo Young Men's Christian Association. Admiral Uriu, while a student, was President of the Y. M. C. A. These may explain the Emperor's gift to the Association. General Kuroki and General Oku are both members of the Presbyterian church, and are known as men of piety and righteousness of life. Other Generals and Admirals are members of other churches.
