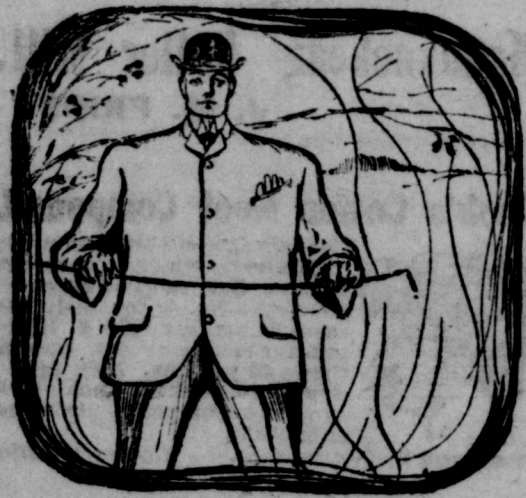

Canada's customs revenue for the fiscal year ending June 30th was \$41,634,873, an increase of \$1,225,971 as compared with the previous year. The total customs revenue in 1896, the last year of Conservative rule, was \$20,219,000. In nine years under Sir Wilfrid Laurier the revenue more than doubled. The revenue for June was \$3,721,937, which is \$12,216 in excess of that of June, 1904. The figures showing the foreign trade operations of the year are not yet complete, but they will also show an increase. The growing times continue.
