Time for Boiling Vegetables.

Asparagus three-quarters of an hour, cold water; new potatoes, 20 minutes, boiling salted water; sweet corn, 5 minutes, boiling water; summer beets, 1 hour, cold water; winter beets, 3 hours, cold water; onions, 1 1/2 hours, hot water; peas, 1 hour, hot water; turnips, (sliced) 1 1/2 hours; summer squash, 1 hour, steamed over boiling water; cauliflower, 20 minutes, boiling water. It should be tied up in cheese cloth or mosquito netting before cooking and carefully examined. If possible allow it to soak in cold well salted water. Serve with a rich white sauce.
