The New Survey.

Chief Commissioner Parent of the G T P has, on behalf of the commission, promised that a new survey of certain portions of the Valley Route will be made in order to ascertain whether it is possible to avoid difficulties reported by the engineers, particularly in the thirty miles above Fredericton where some high bluffs were encountered. Mr Parent seems perfectly open to conviction and is determined that a fair test will be made of the rival routes. Messrs Carvell, Thompson and Whitehead laid the facts plainly before the commissioners, who assured the gentlemen that they would look carefully into the merits of the two routes from every standpoint, and decide the case on its merits, without any prejudice whatever.

The Commissioners.

The Grand Trunk Pacific Construction Commission passed through Woodstock and the Valley this week, accompanied by F B Carvell M P, Senator Thompson, Senator King and W T Whitehead M P P. The assistant chief engineer of the G T P was along and was driven by team from here to Fredericton accompanied by Messrs Carvell, Thompson and Whitehead. The SENTINEL has reason to believe that the engineer and the commissioners had their eyes opened to the advantages of the Valley Route and there are excellent reasons for believing that a new survey of the River Route will be made, as the first was done rather hastily. Advocates of the Valley Route are full of hope.

SHOCKING ACCIDENT.

A shooting accident took place in the woods back of Grafton Saturday afternoon by which a young boy named James McRae lost his life. A party of youngsters were out hunting and in firing at a squirrel the discharge from a gun in the hands of Billy Blake struck young McRae in the side, killing him instantly. A coroner's jury was empanelled and found the shooting entirely accidental. Much sympathy is felt for all concerned in the sad affair.

Carleton Co-operative Fire Insurance Association.

An adjourned meeting of the members of the above institution was held in the town council chamber on Wednesday evening. John A Lindsay occupied the chair. There was a good attendance. The report of John McCormac, secretary, showed that the only loss during the year was one of \$75. There are about 70 members. The company has assets amounting to a considerable sum, and as risks are accepted only after the most rigid inspection the association is perfectly safe. A hearty vote of thanks was tendered the secretary for the efficient manner in which he conducted the business of the year. The following directors were elected by ballot:—Hon H A Connell, Hugh Hay Esq, ex-Coun R B Jones, H N Payson Esq, John McCormac Esq, ex-Mayor J A Lindsay, and His Worship Mayor Jones.

At a subsequent meeting of the Directors Mayor Jones was elected president and John McCormac secretary. At this time when the old line companies are piling on higher premiums people are naturally turning to the Co-operative companies for relief. Any person in Carleton County who desires information concerning the local association will receive the same upon application to the president, secretary or any director. The matter is well worthy of investigation.

LEG BROKEN.

While working on the excavation, Emerald Street, near the Palm Garden Wednesday afternoon, John Brown had his leg broken. The ground caved in and the unfortunate man was thrown into the trench. He was taken to the hospital where the injured member was given surgical attention.

C M Sherwood, Centerville, wishes to say —a great many farmers have a wrong impression regarding the unusually large yield of flour from a given amount of wheat in his new roller mill. The quality of the flour next the Bran is more valuable than that located in the centre of the "berry", and the reason I give more flour than it is possible for the ordinary roller mill to do is that I have more roll surface—120 square feet of steel surface, and more perfect machinery for extracting and separating the flour from the bran and shorts, and not the mistaken idea that I give too large a yield by grinding too closely. Appealing to the intelligent observer, we will allow the flour to take the witness stand and speak for itself; for it is decidedly whiter than any Ontario or Manitoba flour that comes to Carleton County and if ground too closely, it would be utterly impossible to retain its snowy whiteness.—40-4f.
