It is reported that a couple of Queen Street parties who agreed to subscribe to the Carnival funds refused to fork over the dough because the parade did not pass along that street, and also on account of no electric lighting being done there. Marseilles, July 18.—It is stated that when the Russian converted cruiser Dnieper arrived at Port Said with the crew of the British steamer St Kilda, which the Dnieper had sunk, the British complained to the consul that the captain of the Dnieper was determined to take them to Russia.

The consul, accompanied by the commanders of the British cruisers Lancaster and Suffolk, boarded the Dnieper, and requested that the British subjects on board be liberated.

The captain of the Dnieper rudely refused the request, whereupon the consul informed him that if they were not released within an hour special measures would be taken. The consul and the officers accompanying him then left the Russian warship.

Immediately afterwards the Lancaster raised anchor and swung round, ready to approach the Dnieper. This hint was sufficient for the Russian captain, who instantly sent the St Kilda's crew ashore. They were brought here on a P & O Liner.

Canadians Captured The Cup.

A special from Bisley Camp says:—The important event on the programme of the National Rifle Association was the Kolapore cup match for which Canada, the Motherland, Transvaal, New Zealand and Guernsey competed, Canada capturing the prize with a total score of 755 points. The Transvaal was second with 756; the Mother Country third with 752; New Zealand fourth with 749, and Guernsey fifth with 734.

Canada started off in grand form and at the completion of the 200 yards had a lead of five points. Capt Elliott put on a splendid 34, and Staff Sergt Crowe and Private Wilson were close up with 33. Wilson's score giving the best reading, as he finished with three bulls. The other five men turned in scores of 32.

In the second range, Canada scored 511, the Transvaal 515, New Zealand 508, the Mother Country 503, and Guernsey 490.
