Church Consecrated.

On Saturday, July 15th, the Bishop of Fredericton visited Centerville in Carleton County and in the evening held a Confirmation, when the rector, Rev E W Simonson, presented ten candidates.

On Sunday morning early the Bishop drove over to Glassville, which forms part of the same mission. At eleven o'clock he consecrated the new church at Glassville, which is a wonderful testimony to the earnest and preserving work of Mr Simonson. The deed of the land was presented by the donor, Mr Robert D Montgomery, and was offered on the Altar by the Bishop. The deed of consecration was read by Archdeacon Neales, who also read the second lesson. The first lesson was read by Mr Watkins,

the lay-reader. The Bishop preached the sermon.

In the afternoon the Bishop held a confirmation. At this service there was a most touching incident. When the Bishop came down to confirm the candidates, an old woman, with her face beaming with joy, pushed her way up through the crowd which filled the aisle and joined the candidates. It had been doubtful whether she would be able to come; but she had made the effort, and her thankful gratification was wonderfully manifest in her eager delight shown in her face and manner.

The day was beautiful, and the church was overflowed with attentive congregations, though the dust in the roads was excessive. The offerings at the two services amounted to more than fifty-two dollars.

Altogether it was a day to be much remembered, and greatly encouraged the Bishop, who was driven back by Mr Simonson to his rectory, after drives which amounted to thirty-six miles.—Gleaner.

May Get \$100,000 Each.

SPECULATION AS TO DOCTORS' FEES FOR CLARK OPERATION.

New York, July 18.—Senator Clark, after undergoing one of the most serious of surgical operations, is on the road to recovery.

An interesting feature of the case is the fee that will be paid by the copper king to the men who brought him through the crisis. The operation itself is admittedly one of the most delicate known to surgery. Rare skill and iron nerve are required, and both Drs McKernon and Mason possess these to a marked degree. Fortunes have been paid by men far less wealthy than Senator Clark for the services of experienced surgeons. His Majesty of Russia is said to have rewarded the physician of the empress at the birth of the heir with a fee of \$250,000 and a decoration.

Mr Armour of Chicago paid more than \$100,000 to Dr. Lorenz of Vienna for curing the deformity of his little daughter. The late Dr. Evans of Paris, the American dentist who assisted the Empress Eugenie to escape from a mob, was made many times a millionaire in return for his work on

the teeth of royalty and its friends. It is felt by many that for complete restoration to health Senator Clark will draw his cheque to each of his physicians for \$100,000. This means to the Montana multi-millionaire possibly two days' income from his vast mining interests.
