An Episode With The Czar.

Here is an account of a little incident that occurred in Russia a few years ago in the course of a struggle between Witte and Plehve for supremacy. A United States traction owner, visiting St Petersburg, was impressed with the inadequacy of the horse-car service and employed engineers to work out a modern system. Failing to make an impression on the local officials he had abandoned the plan when he fell in with a clever Russian, who assured him that his ignorance of the ways of the country was responsible for the failure, and offered to engineer the deal for a part interest in the company. The first step was to purchase, for several thousand roubles, the sympathy and support of a certain *dansoue* of the capital. Everything went smoothly and Witte finally wrote a report recommending the scheme and the Czar indorsed on the document: "I approve this in every particular." Thereupon a United States rival attempted to blackmail the successful franchise holder. When the man refused to be held up the rival set various influences at work. A few days later Plehve handed the Emperor a report condemning the traction scheme and favoring its annulment, across which Nicholas. "I approve this report in every particular." Horse-cars still operate in St Petersburg.

This episode illuminates one phase of the Czar's character. It also, perhaps, helps explain why Russia is fighting on such unequal terms with the business-like armies of Japan.

Interesting Address.

Miss Robertson, a Missionary from Japan was the speaker at the evening service in the Methodist Church last Sabbath. In the course of an interesting and well-delivered address she touched upon the work done in the Island Empire under the Women's Missionary Board. For fourteen years Miss Robertson was intimately associated with the efforts of the board's helpers and teachers. Their work was mainly in founding and carrying on schools where native girls could be educated and christianized. In Japan, as in all non-christian lands, there is even to-day a strong feeling that women are decidedly inferior to the men. At first there was considerable opposition to the missionaries but this was gradually overcome until now in all the islands the work is highly regarded. In Tokio, the capital of the country, a city of a million people covering fifty square miles and divided into fifteen divisions, the board maintains a large school or secondary college in which many of the leading women of Japan, wives of dipo-mates, warriors and princes, obtained their education, and not a few of whom have done wonders in spreading the Christian faith. Seventeen years ago when Miss Robertson was ordered to go inland ninety miles to found a school in a somewhat inaccessible part of the island of Yeddo it was necessary to proceed first by means of the primitive Japanese carriage, a sort of a truck wagon, and finally for fifteen miles on foot over a high mountain. "Fuji Yama," the sacred mountain of Japan. The people are intense Buddhists. They have long been suspicious of the intentions of the missionaries. It is perhaps owing to this fact that christianity has so far made comparatively little progress, there being only about 45,000 converts in a population of forty five millions. Even though the outlook be none too encouraging there is yet hope for the future. The Emperor and the royal household along with the princes, nobles and dignitaries, recognize the advantages which come to the people through contact with and instruction from the missionaries. Before many years the heaven may spread through the whole mass and the people of Nippon become believers from the emperor to the humblest peasant.

Alexander and Hyde Combine Forces.

Overshadowing in interest all the other sensational developments in the affairs of the Equitable Life Assurance Society, attendant on the rejection by the directors and the publication of the report of the Frick committee, the announcement that the controversy between President Alexander and Hyde is at an end and that these two gentlemen have concluded a defensive and offensive alliance.

Mr Alexander and Mr Hyde were in conference recently with a number of their friends and advisers for more than two hours. It was made evident that there is scant probability that the resolution of the directors to create the office of chairman of the board with plenary power over all departments and affairs of the society will ever be put into execution.

Mr Alexander's statement was long and went into the Frick report in detail. He declared the Frick report "in many respects unjust" and said it was based upon "incomplete data," at the same time promising that there would be "submitted to the board statements from the secretary and from other officers who from their intimate relation to the various phases of the business are well qualified to discuss the report in such aspects."

Oxford and London.

On Tuesday there will be by-elections for the federal house in two Ontario ridings, North Oxford and London. The opposition party are fighting on a single issue, the School Clause in the Autonomy Bill. In indications are that the two seats will return government supporters. If this should prove the case, the conservative agitation against the Northwest legislation will be given a death blow. It is to these constituencies that the conservatives have made their appeal. Should they elect opposition members it would put new life into the fight against the measures, but we have reasons for believing that Mr George Smith and Hon Chas Hyman will be handsomely endorsed.

"Jap Navy Finest in the World."

The Tokio correspondent of the Daily Telegraph says that the captain of the armored cruiser Dmitri Donskoi, when interviewed, admitted the foolishness of trying to force the Tan Straits. He said:

"The Japanese navy was the finest in the world. The crews were so cool and brave as to appear almost like demons and not human."

The crew of the cruiser Ural describe how three successive 12-inch shells completely disabled the vessel and sent her to the bottom inside of forty minutes.

All the correspondents contrast the accuracy of the Japanese gunnery with the wild firing of the Russians, who were outfought and outmanoeuvred at all points.

It is stated that Admiral Togo the night before the battle, when he knew from his scouts that the Russians would be off Tsu Island the following morning, and knowing that all his preparations were complete, slept soundly.

A Michigan editor grew tired of wailing the whitewash brush in the matter of obituaries and decided to reform and tell the truth just once. He commenced as follows upon the death of a well known citizen:—"Died. —, aged fifty six years, six months and thirteen days. Deceased was a mild mannered pirate, with a mouth for whiskey and an eye for boodles. He came here in the night with another man's wife and joined the church at the first chance. Rojestvensky was deeply moved by the Admiral's words and thanked him. He congratulated Japan on the courage and patriotism of her sailors and said it lessened his regret and the sorrow of defeat to know the high character of the victors.
