Paying England's Fighters.

Great Britain's greatest soldiers and sailors receive great rewards for their services. It is now proposed to give an honorarium of \$125,000 to Admiral Sir John Fisher, First Lord of the Admiralty. Lord Wolsey received an award of \$125,000 after the Ashanti expedition and another of equal amount at the conclusion of the Egyptian war in 1892. Lord Alcester received a peerage and \$125,000 for the bombardment of Alexandria, a day's work, which was valuable largely because it disclosed the weakness of the British navy at that time. Lord Roberts received \$500,000 besides his full pay as commander in chief for his work in the Boer war, and Lord Kitchener received \$250,000 for his services in the same struggle.

Fortune For a Vase.

Four thousand guineas was given recently at Christie's, London for a small Sevres porcelain vase about 16 hands high, similar to one in the royal collection at Buckingham Palace.

This collection of Sevres was formed by George IV, and is reputed the finest in England. Several pieces disappeared many years ago. The late owner is stated to have inherited the vase sold recently with family heirlooms.

When the precious object was put up the room was crowded to excess, every dealer and collector of importance being present, and from Mr Wertheimer's opening bid of 1,000 guineas the excitement was intense.

Mr Duveen immediately bid an advance, and the figure rapidly mounted to 2,500 guineas, when Mr Wertheimer dropped out. His place was taken by Mr Seligmann, but he soon retired also.

Mr Partridge then slipped in with an offer of 3,100 guineas, and increased his opponent's bids till his offer of 4,000 guineas remained unchallenged.

A Schoolboy's Discovery.

That nature is still full of simple facts of scientific importance yet awaiting notice by open eyes and minds is shown by the recent achievement of a Dutch schoolboy named Van Erpeum, who during a lesson in physics given in the high school at Batavia called Dr Van Deventer's attention to the fact that the water in a glass filled to the brim with water and floating ice does not flow over as the ice melts. In fact, no change of level whatever occurs. Dr Van Deventer communicated this observation to Professors Van der Waals and Zeeman, who thought it of sufficient importance to be placed before the Royal Academy of Amsterdam. It is proposed to call the phenomenon the "law of the permanent level." It is found to be rigorously exact only when the weight of the air is neglected.

Russians Were "Confident of Victory."

A telegram from Sasebo says: "A member of the Russian staff, being asked why the Russian ships took the risk of essaying the Tsu Strait, said:

"We were confident of victory. Reaching Vladivostok was not the only object of our fleet. The emperor commanded us on leaving the Baltic to fight and defeat our enemy and we were anxious to obey his orders. We were confident and ready to fight from the start. Our mission is ended."

"Of the captives brought to Sasebo, the battleship Nicolai I. is the most seriously damaged. There are many holes in her port side over three feet in diameter and the majority of her quick firing guns on the port side were destroyed. Her forward funnel is partly shot away and one hole along the waterline measures ten feet."

A despatch from Maizurn says that the Japanese battleship Asahi was largely engaged with the Russian battleship Borodino. After the Borodino took fire and began sinking, the Asahi suspended firing, but the Borodino continued to fire. Practically her last shot struck the Asahi astern on the starboard side, killing Lieut. Morishita and seven other men.

Nobleman Raises Mules.

William Anson, nephew of Lord Lansdowne, the English statesman, cousin to the Duke of Marlborough, and a near relative to the Duke of Portland, owns a horse, mule and cattle ranch in the San Angelo district of Texas. Mr Anson, during the South African war, acted as an agent for the British Government there in the purchase of horse and mules. He is an expert horseman and much of his time is spent now in training pole ponies. These animals he buys for \$25 each, and after a short course of training he ships them to England, where they bring fancy prices. Mr Anson effects the western ranchman's garb and a few of those who meet him would have taken him for a member of the English nobility.

THE KING'S ENGLISH.

In his speech at the opening of Parliament King Edward of England (his ministers, of course) violated the King's English" with inaccuracies, of which the following are samples: With a fine impartiality he said that "my Government have," "my Government is," "my Government has" and "the Chinese Government have." Then he said "the war which has been in progress since February last continues." Of course it continues; otherwise it would be a war that "had" been in progress. "Progress has notably been made in the reorganization of the gendarmierie, to which officers belonging to my army have contributed valuable assistance." What precedent noun does "which" refer to—progress, reorganization or gendarmierie?

DELUSIVE SOUNDS.

Which is the most reprehensible of the two expressions, "Oh, dear me," or "Not worth a tinker's dam?" Some good folks will be surprised to learn that the former words, for all their apparent innocence, comprise downright hard swearing, being simply an Anglicised form of the Italian "O Dio Mio!"—literally, "Oh, my God!" On the other hand, the latter fierce, round-oath-like expression is merely a harmless industrial simile. The tinker's "dam" was an embankment of clay or putty, by which fused solder was confined to a desired point, and afterwards, when the metal had cooled, the "dam" was broken away and thrown aside as worthless—hence "not worth a tinker's dam."

UNTIL THE ENGAGEMENT IS A FACT.

Until his engagement is an accomplished fact, a young man is at liberty to pay ordinary attentions to more than one girl of his acquaintance. Some inexperienced girls are susceptible, however, that a little notice of them on a man's part, is apt to be taken seriously. It is certainly unkind and unfair to raise hopes which can never be fulfilled. On the other hand, all girls should be taught to regard their men friends merely as friends, until some very plain words have been spoken as to more serious intentions. NEW SECRETARY OF NAVY.

Chas J Bonaparte, of Baltimore, has been chosen by President Roosevelt to succeed Mr Paul Morton, as Secretary of the Navy. It is nothing remarkable that a great-grand-nephew of Napoleon Bonaparte should rise to a cabinet position in the Republic, of which he is a citizen by birth and descent for three or more generations. The fact, however, goes to prove that a man may achieve distinction of his own, despite a great name, which is more often a handicap than a help to ambition. Besides being a close friend of the President, Mr Bonaparte has the reputation of being an able man of affairs, and one of the leading civil service reformers in the United States. We have seen nothing but complimentary references to his appointment though it does not appear that he has any special qualifications for the position of head of the navy department.

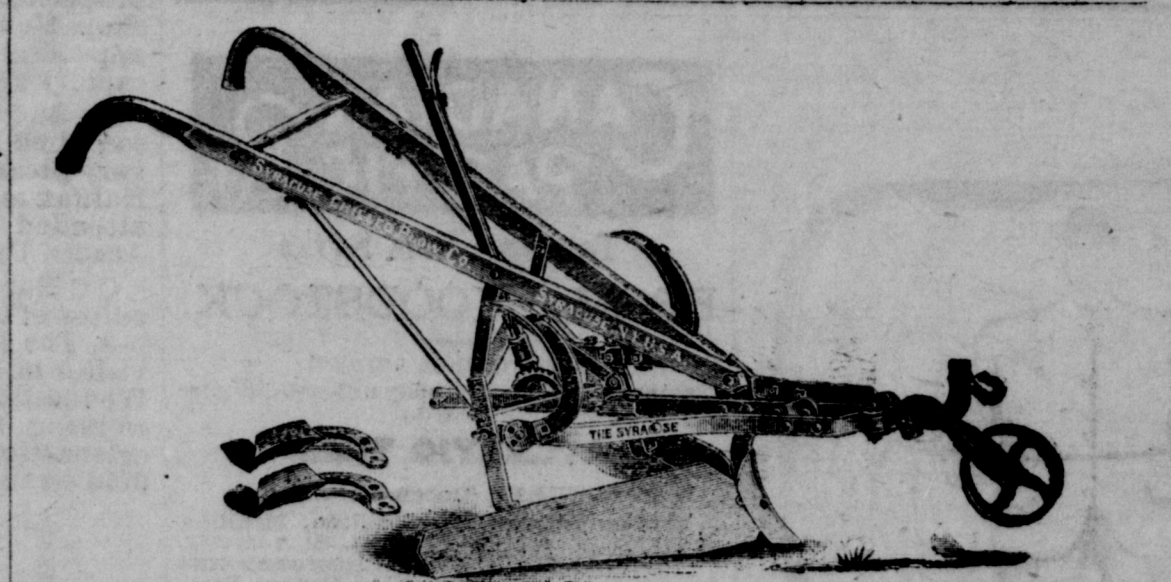

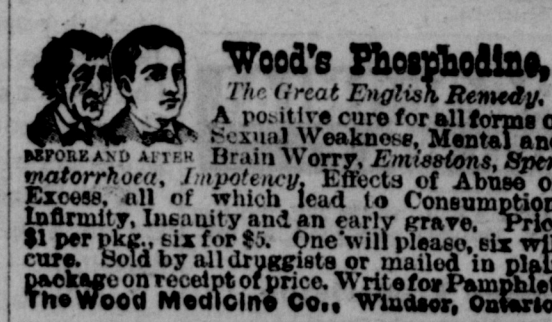
