OBITUARIES.

MRS. THOMAS COURTNEY, SR.

An affectionate wife and mother and a true friend passed away Friday afternoon when Mrs. Thomas Courtney, Sr. died at her home in Woodstock, after several months illness, aged 65 years and six months. Her husband, three daughters Mrs. Owen Kelly, Agnes and Gertrude Courtney, and three sons Michael, Thomas and William, survive. All were present at the death of wife and mother. The deceased was a Miss Madden of Allendale and many relatives are living in York county. A requiem high mass was celebrated in St. Gertrude's church, at 9 o'clock, on Monday morning, by Rev. Fr. McMurray and the interment made in the Catholic cemetery. Undertaker Kelly, of Vanwart's undertaking rooms, was in charge and the following were pall bearers: James S. McManus, I. E. Sheasgreen, M. Murphy and Joseph Fewer.

GEORGE W. RICE.

George W. Rice died at the residence of his daughter, Mrs. C. J. Vanwart, at noon on Saturday, after eight weeks' illness, aged 77 years and four months. He was born in Kennebec County, Maine. Upon the breaking out of the Civil War he joined the 9th Maine Volunteers, served through the war, and enjoyed a pension. Shortly after the war he resided to Presque Isle where he lived 17 years. Religious services were conducted at the home of Mr. Vanwart, on Monday morning, by Rev. I. A. Corbett of the Albert Street Baptist church. A son Charles, and a daughter Mrs. DeMill, accompanied the remains to Presque Isle, on Monday's express, for interment there. Deceased is survived by three sons and three daughters: Charles W., William A., and Albert Rice, all of Boston; Mrs. C. J. Vanwart of Woodstock, Mrs. R. J. Hurst of Pictou, and Mrs. Rufus DeMill of South Framingham, Mass. The deceased came from Houlton, where he had been living, about eight weeks ago, to the Woodstock Hospital for treatment, but when the illness seemed fatal he was removed to his daughter's residence.

Fredericton's Great Show.

Hundreds of Carleton county people attended the great exhibition at Fredericton, which closed on Wednesday. The weather conditions on the whole proved satisfactory, and everybody had a good time. The attendance was as large as could have reasonably been expected. Several attractions added interest to the affair, outside of the many creditable exhibits usually witnessed at exhibitions.

Leonda, the chasm leaper, performed Friday for the first time and delighted everybody with his remarkable exhibition of skill and daring. He gave three exhibitions, one in the afternoon and two in the evening, in the presence of large crowds. Mounted on a bicycle specially constructed for such work, he shot down the one hundred foot incline, and leaped a thirty-five foot chasm. It was certainly a most remarkable feat, and elicited hearty applause from the spectators.

The various side shows and games all did a rushing business on that day. The champion strong woman of the world was holding forth in a tent on the grounds, could be seen for ten cents. She juggles heavy dumb-bells and breaks a strong chain as easily as if it were made of paper.

Another unique attraction, shown in a tent was the "human snake," a contortionist of rare ability. The Parisian beauty show also attracted much attention.

A clever African dodger performed on the grounds near the amusement hall. He was as black as tar, and dodged the balls thrown at him with great dexterity. A cabbage leaf cigar was the reward offered for those who could strike his ebony cranium, and a box of these was likely to last for some time.

The moving pictures and vaudeville performance in the amusement hall attracted large crowds daily.

Races at Fredericton.

The races on Saturday were largely attended. Lady Patton of Springhill, driven by Fred Warren, captured the forty class in straight heats and was never headed. His best time was 2.17, which is one quarter of a second better than the track record, made two years ago.

The twenty-five class was won by Sleepy Jack, a New Glasgow horse, after Will Be Sure had captured two heats. It required five heats to decide it and excitement ran high.

There was an accident in the third heat of the forty class. The sulks of Brown Dick and Daisy Wilkes came into collision, and Brown Dick and Driver James Gallagher got a bad spill, both turning a complete somersault. Mr Gallagher sprained his right wrist, but, righting the sulky, he mounted it and continued the race. The judges held that the accident was unavoidable and gave the Woodstock horse fourth place. Frank Power of Halifax was starter and Dr. N. R. Colter of St. John was one of the judges.
