The People of Japan are as Ignorant of the Meaning of the War as the Russian Peasantry.

Within the last year or two Japan has been flooded with promiscuous writers who have, as a rule, hovered about the capital and treaty ports, where the most progressive side of the country is on exhibition. They have been taken in hand by the Japanese, shown the best schools, the best hospitals and factories, the best of everything ancient and modern the country has to show, and the result has been a lot of very ridiculous comment.—From "The Fruits of Japan's Victory," by Thomas F. Open Ports.

From Tokio comes the announcement that in a few weeks the Manchurian cities of Antung, Daini and Mukden will be designated by Japan as "open ports," free to the merchants of all nations on equal terms of trade. It is said that the State Department at Washington is so well assured of the sincerity of Japan, that it is assumed that, within a year after Japan has taken possession of Manchuria, as she certainly will in the form of a protectorate necessary under the conditions created by the war, the whole province will be thrown open to the world for trading purposes. Such an announcement on the part of Japan will be received with more confidence by the nations than were the many assurances of Russia to a like effect when she was in possession, and was treating the representatives of foreign commerce as subjects and enemies. By thus formally opening the ports now in her possession, Japan would give intimation that she, and not China, is to be for the present considered as mistress in Manchuria, and that she counts on having her tenure confirmed by the consent of the powers, based on a generous acceptance of the Open Door policy.—(Witness)

Hemstitching by Machine.

Prepare the linen by measuring for the hem and drawing the threads at the top, as for regular hemstitching. Turn over the raw edge and baste and fold down the hem, basting so that the turned edge comes directly in the middle of the drawn threads. Loosen the tension of the machine, put the work under the presser foot, hem side up, and stitch close to the turned edge. Now hold the work firmly with the left hand and with the right draw the hem down until the stitches are drawn to the bottom of the drawn threads. If the stitch was right this will part the threads into clusters at one side, while at the other they remain straight, giving a very good simulation of hemstitching. This method of hemstitching is very much used as a finish for pillow slips, children's white dresses and other articles with long spaces to be hemmed, says the New Idea Magazine.

A LARGE FAMILY.

A couple of weeks ago we complimented Alexander Beaudoin upon the safe arrival of his fourth pair of twins, making an even dozen in his family of small children. At that time we thought that this was "about the limit," but we knew not the prolific resources of the town we live in and the inhabitants thereof. Last Friday Sovey Lalonde, a west end resident, dropped into the office of the local registrar of birth, deaths and marriages to record the advent of a new baby boy, and incidentally remarked that that was his twenty-sixth. Regular exercise every day in all weathers.

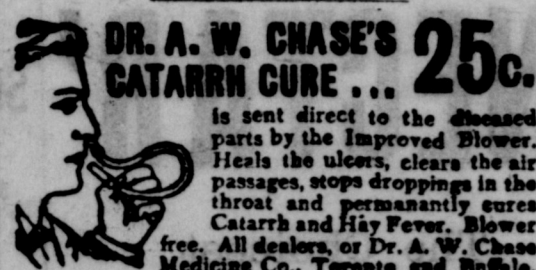
Sleep only from six to seven hours, going to bed early and rising early.

CANADIAN ASSOCIATED CABLES.

London, July 28.—In a week's time some three thousand time-expired men of good character, all under thirty-five years of age, will be discharged at Horsesham Barracks. The Sussex emigration commissioner is in communication with the authorities for permission to distribute literature, also to deliver an address on the advantages of Canadian emigration. The request will probably be granted. It is hoped many will be induced to make homes for themselves in Canada. Every one of the men will have between thirty and forty pounds.

Don't Steal Birds.

Young birds should never be taken from the nest unless one knows much about their feeding habits in captivity, and once taken and reared it is nothing short of cruelty to set them free again. For while in captivity many kinds of birds can be made perfectly happy, yet they will never have learned to find their own food, and if given their freedom the following fall or spring they will perish miserably. Cedar birds, vireos and warblers are very difficult to raise and should never be taken from the nest, but a song sparrow, robin, thrush or sparrow hawk, if well cared for, will become tame and if given the run of an entire room will furnish unending amusement.—C. Hidden Treasure in England.

In England when hidden treasure is found the law requires the coroner to hold an inquest over it. Formerly it was a coroner's duty to hold an inquest in case of a burglary. A statute of Edward I. decrees that "when coroners are commanded by the king's bailiffs or by the honest men of the county they shall go to the places where any be slain or suddenly died or wounded or where houses are broken or where treasure is said to be found and shall forthwith command four of the next towns, or five, or six, to appear before him in such a place."

Napoleon's Manners.

Napoleon was rude. His manners were coarse, and when at table he ate as fast as he could chew and swallow, shovelling the food into his mouth with his knife and using his fingers whenever they came into more convenient employment. When talking to his officers he often as a friendly favor pulled their whiskers or pinched their ears. To women he was almost invariably offensive, sometimes uttering language so coarse as to bring a flush of shame to their cheeks and tears to their eyes.

Strawberry Float.

Crush two quarts of ripe berries and whip into them the stiffly beaten whites of three eggs and a cupful of sugar; beat until light and foamy, turn into a deep dish and chill on ice. Make a custard by beating the yolks of three eggs with a cupful of sugar and adding a cupful and a half of thin cream; cook in a double boiler until the custard coats the spoon; flavor with almond extract and when cold pour around the prepared strawberries and serve.

To make violet toilet water mix together two and three fourths drams of extract of violet, same amount of cassia, five and a half drams of tincture of orris root, one and a quarter of tincture of civet, five drops of bitter almonds, five drops of rhodium, one-half pint of alcohol and six and a half drams of rose water.
