Oats were selling there for 44 cents, 3 year old steers for about fifty dollars each, pork 5 cents per lb live weight, but it is a newly settled country, what is settled, and one will not have the society or neighbors they have been used to in the past. However, I must say that we were well treated wherever we went and found the people hospitable, obliging, ready to give you all the information in their power and always glad to brag on their new or adopted country.

There are many things I would like to speak about if I had the time and you had the space but I feel I must draw to a close; so after travelling 2900 miles by rail and 600 over the prairie, cooking wild duck, snipe and prairie chicken, pitching our tent for the night by the side of lake or stream where the buffalo roamed for ages and where their bones are now bleaching by the wayside, we began to think of our far away N B home and that it was time to retrace our steps. We are glad indeed that we have seen for ourselves part of the Great West and its wonderful expanse of both level and rolling prairie. Glad also that Canada has such an heritage as the great West and as we return to our Eastern home and our eye is gladdened with the sight of mountain, stream and forest and the smell of the fields of clover we are more than ever convinced that this Canada of ours has a great future in store. In conclusion I wish to say that from the time I stepped on board the O P R train at Woodstock until I arrived in the West and on my return as well I received nothing but gentlemanly treatment from all the officials of the said road, and one needs to travel over this great transcontinental road to realize what an undertaking the building of this road was and what a grand system it is with its different lines and branches. I wish also to thank John McKay, mayor of Wetskiwin, Edmund Thompson, Dominion Land Guide, and many others for the numerous courtesies I received in the West.
