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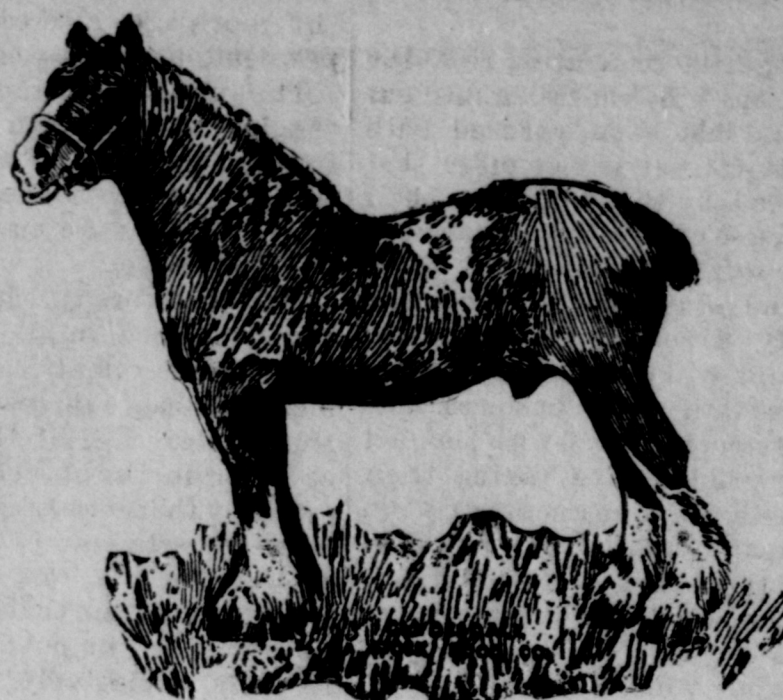

TEACHER'S BUREAU.

A Teacher's Bureau has been established in Woodstock for the purpose of aiding Teachers in securing suitable schools, and Trustees in procuring suitable teachers. About four hundred schools were vacant in this Province last year and the N. B. teacher's association which was organized in the interest of education wishes to see that number reduced. To this end Bureaus are being established in the different counties. Teachers and trustees are urged to send notices of vacancies to the bureau for their County and every effort will be put forward to obtain efficient teachers; notices should state the kind of schools, sex and class of teacher preferred rate of salary, cost of board in community etc.

Teachers desiring schools are invited to apply to the Bureau for lists of vacancies. In doing so they should state the class of license held, experience kind of school and salary wanted. Every effort will be made to meet the desires of trustees and of teachers without cost to trustees or to members of N. B. T. A.
