

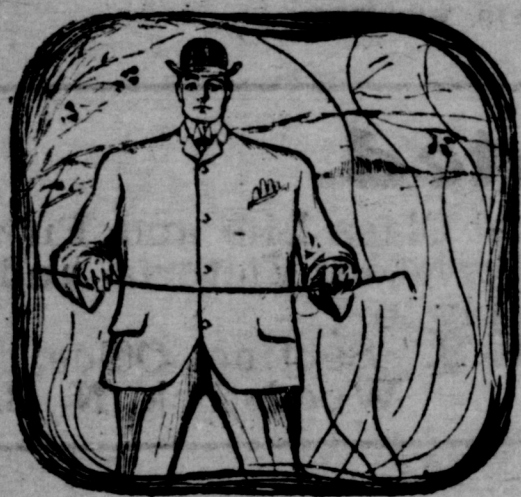

The CARLETON SENTINEL of May 17th, 1905, contains an account of the first Town Election under the Act to Incorporate the Town of Woodstock. There were three candidates for the mayoralty, L P Fisher, James Robertson and Geo W Cleary. The latter received only a handful of votes. Mr Fisher defeated Mr Robertson by a majority of twenty. The first town council was composed as follows:—Mayor L P Fisher, Ward I, W T Baird and Hugh McLean, Ward II Wm F Dibble and W W Hammond, Ward III John Bradley and Edward Smith. D L Dibble was appointed town clerk, C H English marshal and J H Jacques and F Connell constables.

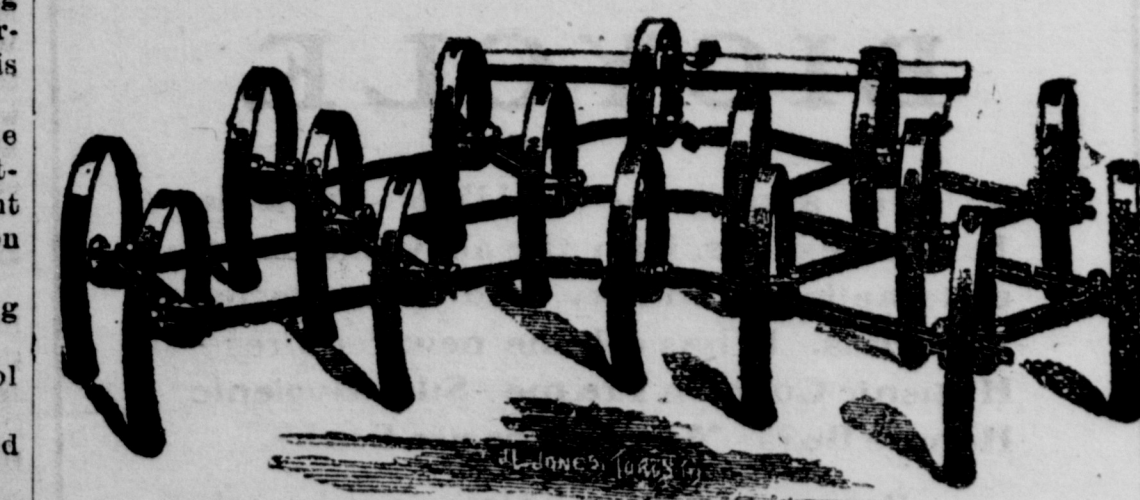
