ROBERT FLEMMING DIES IN KANSAS

Many Carleton County people will be sorry to hear of the death of Robert Flemming. The following notice is taken from Word and Way

published in Kansas City. Flemming.—Robert Fleming was born April 24, 1825, in Carleton County, Canada, and died February 28, 1905, at the residence of his daughter, Mrs Z Nason, 636 Osage avenue, Kansas City, Kansas. He was brought up a Presbyterian, his father being a pioneer missionary along the St John river. Through the influence of his wife whose ancestry was for many generations strictly Baptist, he was baptized into the fellowship of the Armourdale Baptist church of Kansas City, Kensas, November 1, 1893, in which he continued a consistent member until his death. He married Miss Lucy S Hovey, March 22, 1860, and settled upon a farm where he lived until his removal to Kansas in 1893. He was a successful farmer and held various posttions of trust in his native country. He has a brother, John Flemming, in Minneapolis, and two sisters who are widows, Mrs William Kerr, Bangor Maine, and Mrs Lizzie Cluff, Auburn, Maine. His nephew ,James K Flem. ming, is a member of the Provincial parliament from Carleton County, a leader of his party and a noted temperance orator. Brother Flemming lost a son, Horace Flemming on March 22, 1894. He leaves a widow and the following children: Colonel Fred W Flemming, Kansas City, Mo.; Robert E Flemming, Lafayette, New Jersey, and Nettie M wife of Dr Z Nason. The doctor is a prominent physician, a director of the Kansas City Baptist Theological seminary and a trustee of the Armourdale Baptist church, of which he and his wife are mem-
