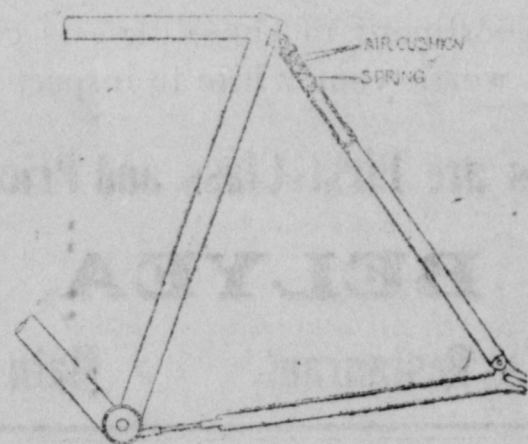

A FINE STABLE.

HON. J. M. JOHNSON, OF CALAIS,
HAS LOTS OF GOOD HORSEFLESH.

Bangor Commercial. J. M. Johnson, of Calais, has 54 stallions, brood mares, colts and fillies, with 16 mares in foal, which, with ordinary luck, will increase the farm's holdings to 70 head. This does not include the geldings in Mr Johnson's campaigning stable. Lord Roberts, the five-year-old son of Arion and Nancy Hanks, is at the head of the stud, and for brood mares he has besides Nancy Hanks, Fanella, 2.13, the dam of Sadie Mac, 2.11; and Todd, 2.14, now in foal to Bingen; The May Fern, 2.11, dam of Lord Revelstoke, 2.12; Rubber, 2.10; Im-providence, 2.12, all in foal to Bingen, as are five other mares at the farm. The farm owns twelve young things sired by Bingen, two by Direct Hal, seven by Peter the Great and one by Todd.

As an up-to-date example of the printer's art the finest catalogue of the year is that of the Calais stock farm, Calais, Maine. J. M. Johnson, owner of Calais farm, certainly has created a high standard with respect to his brood mares. Among them is Nancy Hanks, 2.01, the champion trotter and the dam of Admiral Dewey, 3. 2.14, and Lord Roberts, 3. trial 2.13. She is easily the world's most valuable trotting matron. Then there is Fanella, 2.13, dam of Sadie Mac, 3. 2.11, and Todd, 2.14. Next in prominence comes May Fern, 2.11, dam of Lord Revelstoke, 3. 2.12. The catalogue fairly sparkles with breeding that delights the student of blood lines. The head of the stud is Lord Roberts, an extremely fast young horse by Arion, 2.07; dam, Nancy Hanks, 2.01.

Prosperity of the Doukhobor Colony.

The wonderful prosperity of the Doukhobor colony furnishes enough material to substantiate the wildest claims of the most enthusiastic Canadian immigration agent that ever existed, besides putting for ever at rest the sneers of the wisacres who scoffed at the idea of these peaceful, hardworking people making good settlers.

The colony has now 600 heavy teams, 1,000 milking cows, 1,000 sheep, which are kept for breeding purposes; 200 binders, 200 mowers, 20 steam threshing machines, 6 grist mills, 1 saw mill and one brick yard, besides all the waggon, harrow and other implements necessary to farming. Two years ago the whole colony was practically penniless. To-day thousands of acres are sown in wheat, barley, oats and flax. Only two weeks ago the colony paid \$25,000 dollars for ten complete steam ploughs of 25 horse-power each. These engines are capable of drawing eight ordinary ploughs. The Premier Pitcher.

Jack Chesbro, generally regarded as the premier pitcher in professional baseball and the mainstay of the New York Americans, was taken suddenly ill at the Lexington Hotel, St Louis, Tuesday, and later in the day was put aboard a train for New York and sent back home to recover from a general collapse. Physicians who were summoned agreed that he should go directly to a hospital, as he was suffering from a high fever, but the big twirler refused and said he would return to his home in New York. Chesbro has not been in the best form this year, but Manager Griffith of the New Yorks thought his condition was improving until his late attack. The famous twirler contracted a heavy cold a few days ago and rheumatism developed. The doctors now fear a general breakdown, and say he will be lucky if able to pitch again within six weeks. Manager Griffith takes a less pessimistic view of the case, though, and hopes Chesbro will be able to take his turn in the box within two weeks.

NAVAL ESTIMATES.

London, May 24—In the British House of Commons the debate on the naval estimates for Halifax and Esquimaux occasioned some discussion. T. R. Buchanan asked what the future of them was to be. Arthur Hamilton Lee, Civil Lord of the Admiralty, replied that, regarding Halifax, nothing had been destroyed or allowed to deteriorate, so far as that can be provided against. Due arrangement had been made for the care and preservation of the buildings, appliances and dockyards, and in cases where the Imperial Government had no military establishment arrangements were being made through the colonial Governments for their works-department to carry out the necessary repairs and maintenance and charge the amount to the Admiralty. E. R. Pretyman, Secretary to the Admiralty, said that places such as Halifax and Esquimaux would not now be considered likely to form a part of the field of operations in the event of a declaration of war, and therefore, ships were not kept there as a base, though they visited. Sir J. Colomb said that the speech of the Secretary of the Admiralty dealing with Halifax and Esquimaux showed clearly that the Admiralty was shutting its eyes entirely to the enormous development of sea power in the United States.

The Rough Rider Regiment's
Horses.How many of the horses of this regiment (which seems to have been as proud as a city hoodlum of the name *Rough*) died in Cuba we do not know, but we distinctly remember that the survivors sent to New York City to be sold at auction were in such pitiable condition as to warrant the indignation of every humane man and woman in America.

How many of the Spanish boys, compelled by military draft to leave their homes and serve with little or no pay in the heat of Cuba, were shot by this Rough Rider regiment in response to the order, "Give them hell, boys!" we do not know; but we do know, on the evidence of President McKinley and Secretary of State Sherman, that Spain was willing to abandon Cuba without the firing of a single gun, and that the fate we rectorian will reckon this war a disgrace to a nation claiming to be Christian. Why, when peace negotiations with Spain were almost concluded, and we had a whole fleet of war-vessels within a few hours' sail of Havana, the Maine should have been sent there, unless for the express purpose of preventing a peaceable settlement and gaining glory by forcing us into an unjustifiable war with a weak nation, we do not know; but if the captain of the Maine, while attending with his officers the first Sunday bull-fight that occurred after his arrival and, being warned there by written communication that his vessel was in danger, had ordered some of his boats to be out protecting her nights, it is quite possible that the lives of some three hundred American sailors plunged in one instant into eternity, might have been saved.
