JAPAN AND FRANCE.

In London especially considerable fear is entertained lest complications arise in the war in the Far East owing to the partial conduct of France towards Russia in allowing the latter's warships to harbor so long in French waters. Japan has been continually protesting against it during the last few months, and also has repeatedly called Britain's attention to it, alleging that it really amounts to France breaking its neutrality and aiding Russia, and insisting that that being so Britain was bound by her alliance treaty to help Japan. In return Britain has again and again made representations to France and pointed out the complications likely to arise, but France invariably replied that it had not wilfully committed any breach of neutrality, and followed up each reply by making a show, at least, of insisting on the Russian fleet leaving French waters. That fleet, however, has so persistently taken refuge in these waters for months that it is hard to believe otherwise than that it has been done from a mutual understanding. One can scarcely believe it possible that it has all arisen through a careless administration by France of its colonial government; and yet it is hard to believe that it would intentionally imperil its friendly relations with Britain for the sake of Russia whose friendship weighs little in comparison. Evidently Lord Lansdowne, the British Foreign Secretary, has got tired of making fruitless representations to the French Government on the subject, and is now rather using every effort to keep the Japanese cool, while agreeing with them as to the necessity for France respecting neutrality. Sooner or later, however, there will be an inquiry as to where the Russian fleet got the 120,000 tons of coal which it burned during the last month.

The bridge over the Zambesi river in South Africa was completed the other day, thus forming another link in the Cape to Cairo Railroad. It is said to be the highest bridge in the world.

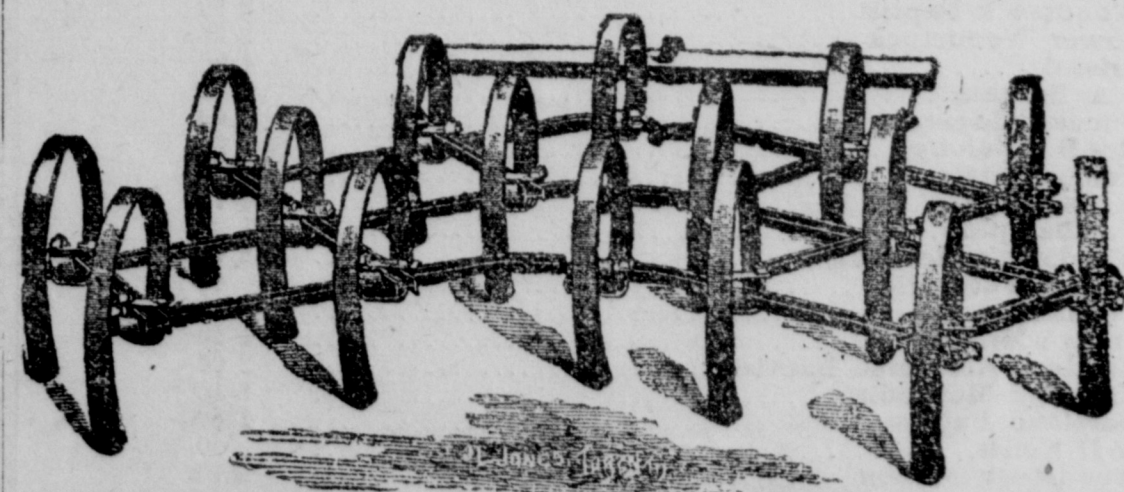

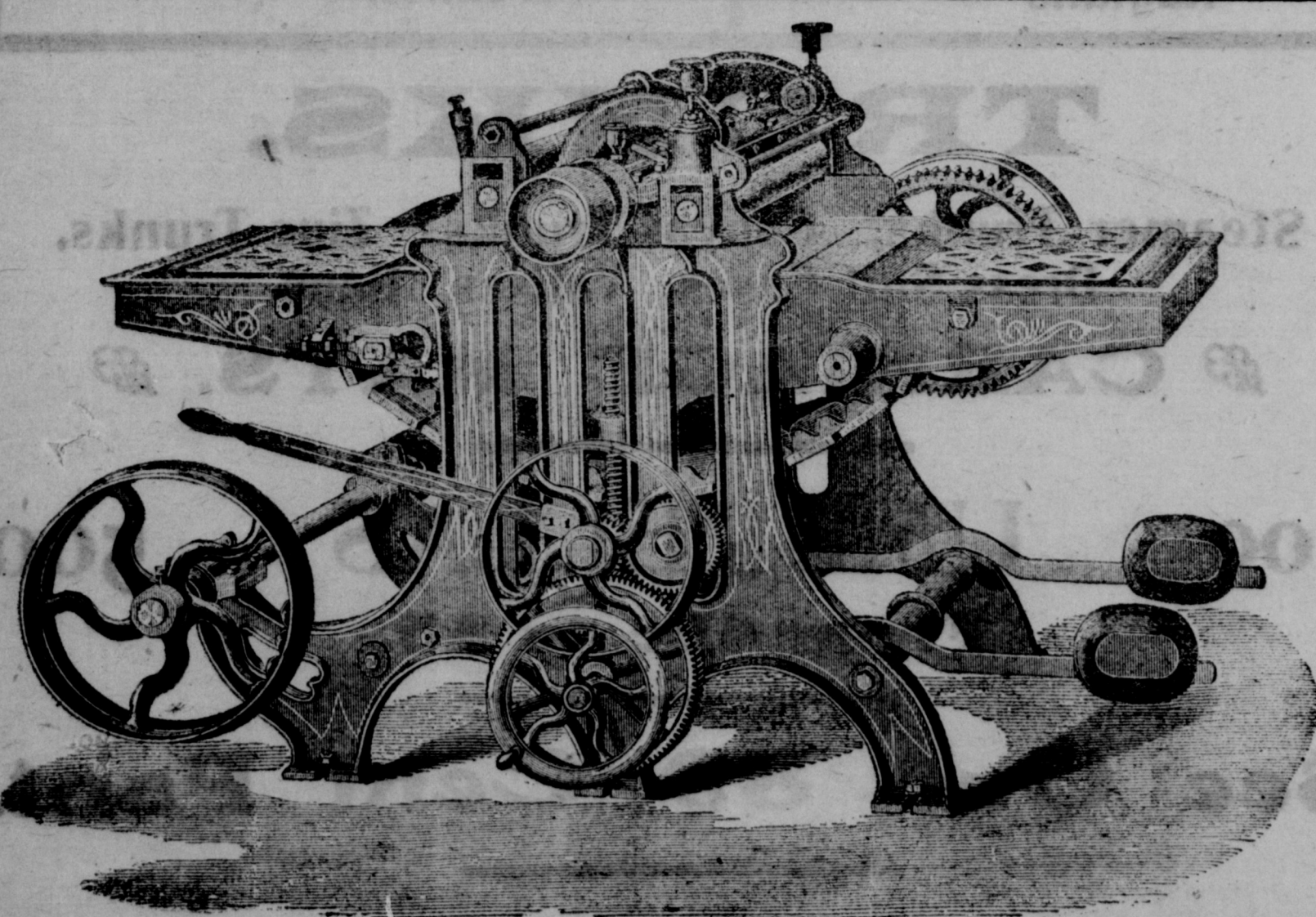
