The Centreville Roller Mill is now doing excellent work, and although there were some four thousand bushels of wheat stored in the mill a few weeks since waiting to be ground, it is now almost clear again. Farmers from distant points should not have to wait long now, unless there is a wonderful rush for the capacity has increased so a grist of 40 or 50 bushels will only require about two hours in grinding. Since the mill has been re-clothed with finer silk it is showing high points of quality and efficiency. Some grists of "White Fife" make considerably over a barrel of good flour from five bushels of wheat, while my old mill took more than six bushels to produce a barrel of flour. I have plenty of water to run 24 hours a day and the mill hands are good enough to run every alternate night until midnight, when the electric light shuts down, until 5 a. m. C. M. Sherwood.

## THE COUNTY COUNCIL.

(Continued.)

Upper Woodstock, Jan. 10th, '05.  
Coun Carvell said that the question of reporting was left over till this session and now was the time for anyone to bring it up.

Coun Raymond thought a great saving could be made in the mode of reporting. As the matter had come up he would like to see it thrashed out. It is an important part of the business as the ratepayers should know in every way and detail how the business is done.

The reporter says he cannot give a verbatim report. It is not what a councillor says but what the reporter considers best that he should say that is reported. He thought a verbatim report was the report the people of the county wanted. The present report was called an official report. He thought that a stenographer could be hired at \$10 a day who would give a verbatim report and then have the report printed in the paper under contract.

Coun Connolly—I was the mover of the resolution last session out of which this question has arisen. I was not satisfied with the reporting for the cost it entailed to the county. I would move that we re-consider the motion appointing the reporter.

Coun Brown—I understood it was for the life of this council that the contract for the reporting was made.

Coun Connolly I would like to understand how the matter stands. I would like to know if the contract was for the life of the council.

On request the sections read the resolution appointing the reporter. Under the motion electing him for the present year, the same contract as to the reporting would be in force as last year.

Coun Connolly thought at the June session there might be a report presented as to a better mode of reporting the proceedings.  
Mr Carvell—I referred to this matter because I knew some members had it up last June. I am perfectly satisfied with the mode we have now. I do not agree with Coun Raymond about reporting every word. I shall certainly vote against a reconsideration of this motion. I do not think a more satisfactory or more economical arrangement can be made.

The reporter on motion was heard. He said that Mr Raymond had misunderstood him about verbatim reporting. A verbatim report means the report of every word, as if it would be spoken into a phonograph, that would be practically impossible for him to take, and he did not know of a shorthand writer who could do so. But he did take a shorthand report and from a long experience in shorthand reporting he said that it was only getting fair pay for the work done. Mistakes were bound to occur in any report. He would be glad, however if any councillor would point to any mistake that occurred in the report of the June session. He himself was pretty well satisfied that that report was as near absolutely accurate as it could be made.

On motion the discussion dropped.  
Coun Raymond moved that a committee be appointed to investigate the question of reporting and report at the June session. Carried.

The warden appointed the following committee for the purpose: Couns Raymond, Bailey and Carvell.

A communication was read from the Executive Council of the Canadian Association for the prevention of consumption and other forms of tuberculosis giving statistics and asking that the council petition the legislature to establish a sanatorium for the province of New Brunswick. On the basis of population there are 140 consumptives in the county of which 28 die each year.

The Warden—You might give instructions that this matter be taken up and a report given in on it tomorrow morning or afternoon or whatever time you think best.

On motion of Coun Fewer the warden was asked to name a committee to report on the matter tomorrow morning.

The warden appointed Couns Bell, Fewer and Connolly.

Coun Brown presented a petition from Brown & Holyoke for a lease of the county grounds at a rental of \$35. They would engage to keep the grass cut and the grounds in good repair. This last year the grass was cut and the work charged to the county. The county got no income and he thought it would be well to let it if there were a few dollars in it. He moved that it be let to Holyoke & Brown for the sum named \$35.

Coun Williams seconded the motion.  
Coun Smith—I would like to hear from Coun McDonald of the building committee.

Coun McDonald—Last year I employed a man to clean up around the jail, the county got nothing. If Brown & Holyoke had it I think it would be in their interests to keep it in good order.

Coun Bailey—I would like to ask if Holyoke & Brown would be allowed to sublet to other individuals for merry-go-round and picnics etc.

Coun Raynor—Would they be allowed to plough up the grounds.  
Coun Brown—They have no intention of ploughing up the ground.

Warden—I would be against it if it allowed the introduction of merry-go-rounds. I would like that sort of thing to be charged \$100 for a license. I think they are a public nuisance.  
Coun Carvell—Does the resolution of this council forbid merry-go-rounds coming into the town.

Warden—No it does not.  
Coun Gallagher—There might be another objection, they might be wanting to move the court house.

Coun Williams—I seconded the resolution to bring it before the council. There was no intention to interfere with the rights of the committee. I am not in favour of taking their rights away; they might lease the ground to other parties for the purpose of making money. As long as the lessees did not interfere with the rights of the gaoler or building committee, I do not see there would be any objection they would keep the grounds clean and the county would get a little money.

Warden—This motion makes the lease subject to the Building Committee.  
Coun Brown—I would not say anything about a merry-go-round. The lease would have to be subject to the approval of the building committee.

Coun Carvell—Holyoke & Brown do not want to lease this ground for their health, they expect to make something out of it. I would feel like having the county keep the grounds in good decent shape without letting it to anyone.

Coun Brown moved that the matter lie over until tomorrow so that either Mr Holyoke or Mr Brown could come and explain the matter.

Motion carried. Adjourned for recess.

On motion of Coun Tompkins seconded by Coun Raymond, a committee was appointed to act with the sections in fixing the amount to be assessed on the county for the ensuing year.

Warden appointed on such committee Couns Bailey, Raymond and Tompkins.

Coun Bailey on behalf of that committee reported that the total assessment proposed was \$8000, made up as follows:

Debiture..... \$1000  
Put on Debt..... 500  
Board of Health..... 250  
Salaries..... 250  
Reporting..... 150  
Repairs to Bldgs..... 500  
Supplies to gaol, courthouse and Record office..... 500  
Pay for councillors..... 250  
Administration of Justice..... 3000  
Grant to Hospital..... 500  
Interest on overdraft..... 340

Report received and adopted and sum of \$8000 ordered to be assessed.  
Coun Connolly—What was the amount for last year?

Coun Bailey—The same.

Coun Williams moved that one half the indebtedness of the different parishes be added to the assessment.  
Motion seconded.

Coun Connolly—Does that mean that one half the indebtedness of each parish in debt be added to the amount each parish has to raise.

Warden—Yes.  
Coun Williams—I think the parishes will be in a position to pay up their indebtedness at that time. I would suggest that anything received up to the first of February be credited to the different parishes and that one half the indebtedness at that time be added.

Coun Williams said he would make his motion to be that one half the indebtedness which the parishes owed at the first of February be added to the county warrant.

Coun Raymond suggested that a little longer time be allowed. He asked the secretary if he could reasonably give till the 15th of February?

Mr. Hartley—I suppose I could, yes. The motion was then amended and passed to read "to the 15th of February."

Coun Tompkins moved that the council go into committee of the whole on the bills and accounts with Coun Bailey in the chair.

Coun Bailey went into committee with Coun Bailey in the chair.

The following bills were dealt with: A. R. Foster \$228.45.

Coun Tompkins called attention to one item where mileage was charged for 60 miles to arrest a party and 30 miles mileage for the same person again. There was \$10 for attending execution of Gee.

On motion the deputy sheriff was heard in regard to his bill.  
Mr Foster—In regard to that warrant, I first traveled 60 miles to get the man, and when I got there I got a telephone message he had gone to another place. I started and went 30 miles again. I was after him two different times.
