VISIT TO NEW YORK.

Mr George W. Olts, superintendent of the Houlton Me district for the Metropolitan Life, has just returned from the annual convention of superintendents, held in New York City, on the 12th and 13th inst. There were 2500 present from all over the United States and Canada. The company has had the most successful year in its history, averaging a million and a half a day in new business. The convention was addressed by Lord Fairbanks of London, Eug. and other distinguished men. On Saturday evening a grand banquet was held at Delmonico's from 6 to 12. Woodstock people will be glad to learn that Mr Olts has done great work during the past year, his district standing thirteenth in the list. This is a remarkable showing when it is known that he has been with the company little more than a year. In this county there is an opening for one or two bright young men to work with the company. As Others See Us.

The *Herald* is not a believer in the principle of introducing federal or local politics into municipal elections, but occasionally the issue is forced, and Liberals when confronted by such conditions must protect themselves. A case in point has occurred at Woodstock. For the past seven or eight years the Conservatives have practically controlled the civic council of that town, and in a very offensive way dismissed Liberal officeholders, and made it unpleasant for even the men who worked on the streets to be of Liberal sympathies. Indeed it was almost impossible for a Liberal to secure the most menial form of employment from the Tory council. The town vote in federal, local, and civic elections went strongly Tory for years, but there has been a change. In the last federal election Mr Carvell carried the town by a majority of nine, and now in a straight party contest, Mr A. E. Jones, a sturdy Liberal, was elected mayor by 25 majority over Mayor Lindsay, Conservative, and four of the six councillors elected by acclamation a week ago are straight Liberals.

This is a very satisfactory change in view of the arbitrary, autocratic way in which the Tories have bossed civic affairs for some years, and is an excellent augury for Liberal success in Woodstock in future elections. Mr F. B. Carvell, M.P., who came down from Ottawa on private business and incidentally to take a hand in the Mayoralty election, has every reason to feel gratified with the result of the contest.—(*Fredericton Herald*)
