VOLUNTEER PASSED AWAY.

Death of Percy Bridges of Company K, First Colorado.

"Sadly and slowly we laid him down * * * and left him alone in his glory." —Wolfe.

It was a sad good-by to the surviving members of Company K, First Colorado volunteers, paid to comrade Percy Bridges at the ice-covered burying ground in Fairmount cemetery to-day. They had journeyed from Martin's undertaking establishment in the biting cold to the plot of the Society of the Philippines in Fairmount, where a soldier's grave had been dug for the departed hero.

For Percy Bridges was a hero in the ranks and out, and in all the months of his illness, which finally carried him away last Friday, he never uttered a word of complaint.

When the call came for volunteers in the Spanish war, Percy Bridges was one of the first of Colorado's noble sons to offer his services. He went to the Philippines with First Colorado and served in the ranks to honor and glory of his country.

While in the Philippines, Bridges contracted the illness which eventually caused his death. After his return to the states he worked for a time in the South at his trade—that of jeweler—but about a year ago he came home. Last Friday night he passed away at his home 1163 South Thirteenth street. All his friends and comrades loved him warmly. He will be greatly missed from the Philippine society meetings, at which he was always a regular attendant.

At rest after a lingering illness of many months of consumption at his home 1163 South 13 St., Denver, Colo, Percy G., son of Geo. W. and Susie J. Bridges. Aged 29 years and four months.

Percy was born in Woodstock, which was the home of his parents for many years, and left there with them when a small boy some 16 or 17 years ago.

Why Canned Meats Poison.

When people are poisoned by eating canned meats, it is not because there was poison in the meat before the can was opened, but because the meat had been allowed to develop the ptomaine poison of putrefaction after the can was opened. It was not canned salmon that poisoned a family that ate it with impunity the first day after it was opened, but it was salmon that was spoiled by forty-eight hours' exposure to the hot and humid atmosphere. It is very rare that any person is made sick by metallic salts in canned foods. The only metal that may, poisoning in the case of these foods is lead, and this is as unlikely as the falling of a meteor on your head. It is not supposable that lead is present in the coating of the tin plate, its use for this purpose being illegal, productive of insignificant saving. It is possible that poisoning may occur from solder, but it is highly improbable from the way cans are made.—American Cultivator.

Major Good was There.

I dropped in for a short time at the annual meeting of the Dominion Rifle Association and heard speeches by Col Gibson, its president, Col Tilton. The opportunity was not given me to be present at the Dominion Artillery Association, but New Brunswick had one fine representative in the person of Major Good, of Jacksonville, Carleton county, whose services in the Boer war were remembered by many friends. The Major was on his way home with his bride (nee Berrie) and stopped off a day at the capital, so that he might be able to attend this meeting. The lady, as well as the Major found many friends.—Hon J V Ellis, in St John Globe.

THE GERMAN NAVY.

New York, March 10.—The Herald publishes the following cable from Berlin: In the Reichstag on Saturday during the discussion of the naval appropriations, Herr Bebel, the Socialist leader, said that if Germany accepted the Naval League's guidance she would, it was estimated, spend \$781,250,000 on additions to the fleet. Germany, he added, had better aim at the culture of her people and the amelioration of social conditions rather than waste the proceeds of labor on useless armaments.

"Against whom are these immense naval preparations directed?" asked Herr Bebel. "England? We can never compete with England on the sea. We have not the money, nor is such rivalry essential to our security. Sea power is necessary to England, but not to us."

"France? The superiority of our land force is a sufficient guarantee of our safety."

"Russia? She will require decades to recuperate."

"North America? War with her is unthinkable."

Horrors of French Congo.

Paris, March 10.—M. Doumergue, who was for many years head of the colonial office, has been interviewed by The Petit Journal with reference to the terrible atrocities on natives in the French Congo, alleged to have been committed by M. Cogue and his associates in the colonial service.

The ex minister stated that he had never known a similar case in his experience, though he had heard of men going mad after being introduced into the midst of savage life.

The story of several natives being obliged to consume soup made from human remains is confirmed by M. Dubois, an eye-witness, who has come back from the Congo disgusted at the cruelties practised by the countrymen.

He declares that at the prison of Bangui it is quite a common thing for the natives to be starved to death. On one occasion 55 women and children so perished, and their thin bodies were afterwards thrown over the cliffs into the river.

He Bought Brandy.

Sydney, N. S.—Interest in the now notorious Calder scandal was revived today when William R. Calder, who is now awaiting trial before the Supreme Court on a number of charges, preferred by his wife, was brought before Stipendiary W R Hearn and examined on another criminal charge, that of indecent assault upon his two and a half year old daughter. Some sensational evidence was adduced at the trial and the case promises to be more interesting than ever. The hearing was adjourned till Saturday. This morning Calder was a witness against the Victoria Hotel, where he is at present boarding, in a Scott Act case and his evidence of having purchased brandy over the bar was sufficient to convict the proprietor.
