To the Editor of Carleton Sentinel:—

MACKENZIE ACQUITTED.

Pictou, Oct. 21.—The manslaughter case of the King vs McKenzie closed late this afternoon and resulted in a verdict of acquittal. Most of the day was taken up by addresses to the Jury by W. B. A. Ritchie, K. C., for the defence, and Attorney General Drysdale for the prosecution. Both gentlemen made able and exhaustive arguments from their respective view points.

Judge Graham, in submitting the case to the Jury, contented himself with presenting the law bearing on the case, and made practically no observations that could be regarded as disclosing his private opinion as to what verdict ought to be, although some of his hearers gained the impression that he looked for a verdict "Guilty", and in sentencing the prisoner would deal leniently with him.

However, the Jury, after full deliberation brought in a verdict of "Not guilty" and McKenzie was in due time liberated much to his own and friends delight. The court closed about six o'clock after disposing of a couple of unimportant cases.

FLORENCEVILLE CONSOLIDATED SCHOOL.

Almost a year ago the people of Florenceville, East Florenceville and Connell decided to consolidate and erect a suitable building at Florenceville for the purpose.

The site is the prettiest that could have been chosen. It is on the west side of the St. John, and only a little way from the Florenceville Superior School, famous on account of the bright career of so many who received their early education in it.

The first thing to occupy the committee's attention was the subject of water. Caldwell and Smith drilled the well which is 120 feet deep.

Then the next was the foundation for the building. The contract went to Mr. John R. Tompkins and the work was completed in July.

B. F. Smith M. P. P. has the contract for finishing the building, which is 64x50, of brick, and will consist of two floors and the basement. In the basement there are two furnace rooms 25x50, boys' playroom 25x25, fuel room 25x25, ash room, pump and boys' toilet.

On the second floor, the door as you go in opens into a hall. To the left of that is the Manual Training Room and Intermediate Room. To the right is the Laboratory and the Principal's Room.

On the second floor there is a hall, and on the left hand side is the Primary Room and the Household Science Room. On the opposite side are two Class Rooms. The girls toilet is on this floor.

The flues are now finished and plastering will start next week. The

roof is on and the building is all ready for the furnaces which were made by The Record Foundry Co, Sackville, N. B.

It is not likely that the school will be open until next summer. A first class staff will be secured. The building, with its equipment, will form the finest consolidated school in the province.

Practice Firing is Costly.

Halifax, Oct. 24.—The practice firing by ships of second cruiser squadron in the vicinity of Halifax resulted in expenditure on ammunition alone of over \$35,000. This is irrespective of damage to targets, which will amount to fully \$5,000. This wear on guns is another feature not considered in this figure, to say nothing of the total loss of a white torpedo valued at \$2,000. In the practice the Drake proved to have the best gunners by quite a margin. The Berwick was second. To show the speed with which the immense guns on board these ships can be manipulated the Drake fired from one side of the ship alone in the space of ten minutes over 135 projectiles. This was done by five minutes volley firing and five minutes independent firing from nine, two and six-inch guns.

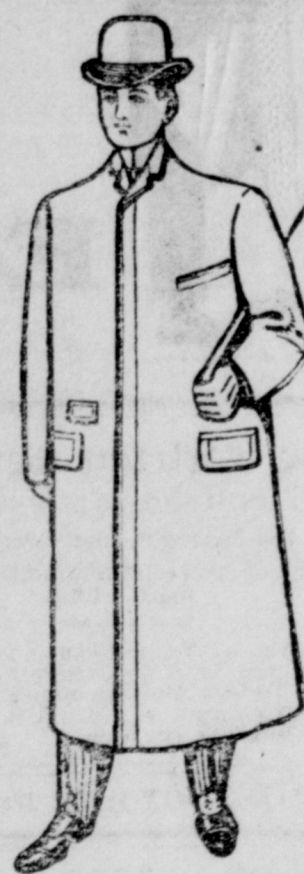

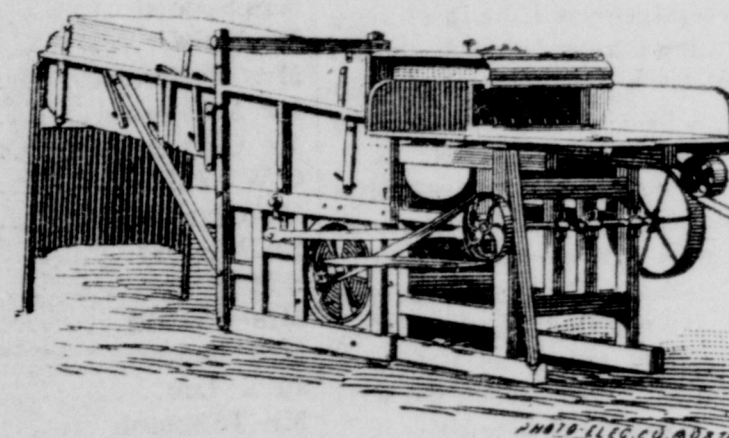

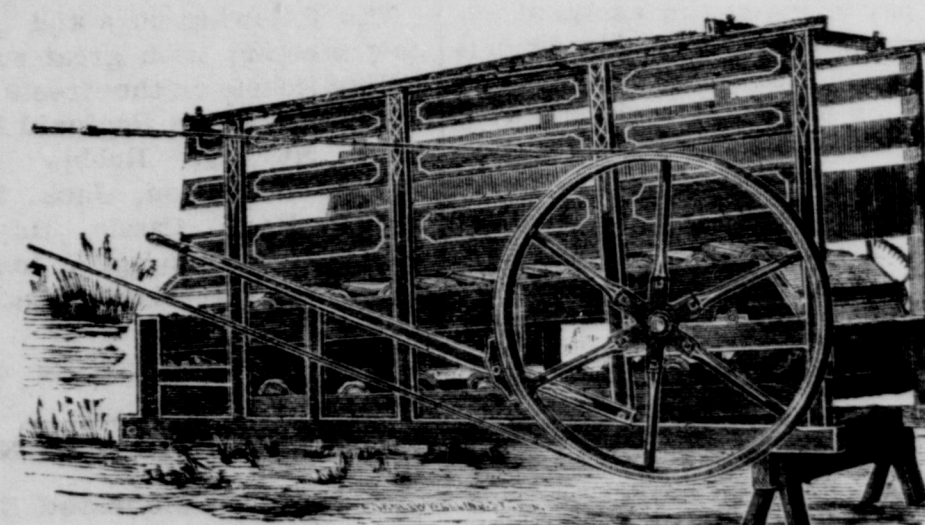
