Why all this hero worship of Mr Simms on the part of the machine Tories? Can it be that they intend putting him on their ticket next time the local election takes place? What will Mr Hartley and his friends have to say to this?

Mr Simms has contracted the letter writing habit. He makes sweeping denials, but when the proper time comes he and Mr Charles Trafton Boyer will have ample opportunity to make their statements under oath. We wonder if they will deny everything then.

Says the Press:—"The special issue of the SENTINEL on Wednesday last indicates that the SENTINEL has lost something." The last two or three issues of the Press prove that the opposition organ has lost what ever small amount of decency it may at some time have possessed.

Liberals will take notice that the Harland Advertiser's one sided account of the court house proceedings has been copied by the St John Sun and is being used to hurt the party. Nice way for an "Independent" journal to act. We have more than a suspicion that Mr B Frank Smith has a string on the "Tiser's" alleged independence.

We have no desire to cast any aspersions upon Mr Simms personally or impeach his motives in any manner, yet we do most emphatically protest against him allowing himself to play the role of a tool in the hands of Mr Benjamin Franklin Smith and a few other soreheads in the local Tory party. We really believe Mr Simms has been imposed upon by his so-called friends.

The Press says it simply gave the facts of the Simms case. Well, the "facts" which it gave may be believed by some of its eight or nine hundred readers, but we would advise all who would like to have the whole matter cleared up to postpone judgment for a few weeks, and not be guided by the irresponsible utterances of soreheads and mosebacks such as the parties who prepare matter for the Press.

Says the St John Telegraph:—"This journal is scarcely prepared to believe that thousands of voters were crying for the candidacy of Mr Simms and that the sheriff of the county is at once a tool and a robber." The Telegraph is correct. No sane person really believes the charges now being hurled at the sheriff. It suits the opposition to make them for political purposes. The parties who have been so prolific in making these libellous statements are likely in the near future to have cause for regretting their action.

The Press has a complaint about the mail to St Thomas P. O. It says the Press bundle of a week ago Monday did not reach that office until Thursday. Mail to St Thomas goes by stage. On the date in question a mail bag containing the Press was brought to the post office only a few minutes before the arrival of the express for points north, and too late to be sorted. A representative of the Press assured the local post office authorities that the bag contained nothing but mail for points reached by the train. The St Thomas bundle was in that bag. The fault belongs to the Press itself. Why did the Press mailing hands put the St Thomas bundle in a bag they knew had not time to be sorted?

The appeal in the case wherein J J Hale is plaintiff and the Public Mfg Co defendant has been dropped by the company. Mr Hale had won in the Victoria county court and on appeal to the Supreme Court at Fredericton. The amount involved is between two and three thousand dollars.

## The Gathering of the Clans.

Last Friday evening a trio from Florenceville East, Messrs Chas. T. Boyer, Robert Hume and B. F. Smith M. P. P. arrived in town. They were joined by Messrs Winslow, Hartley, Balmain and others at the Carlisle Hotel. On the late express J. D. Hazen, leader of the opposition, put in an appearance and all day Saturday the faithful met in secret conclave. It is understood Mr. Hazen came up for the purpose of hearing the Tory version of the proceedings at the court house on nomination day. The genial opposition leader was no doubt seeking ammunition for his annual big speech at the opening of the house. Those who have in the past witnessed his exhibitions in which multiplicity of words and lack of ideas largely figure, will not greatly fear his denunciation. The honorable leader must have been out of a job when he thought it worth while to come here to get the details of the up river plot.

## Mr. Hazen's Jeremiad.

As noted elsewhere, the leader of the provincial opposition spent Saturday in Woodstock in consultation with the machine element of the Carleton County conservative organization. It was expected that he would have something weighty to say on the Simms case as a result of his journey, and those who looked for an ultimatum from the opposition chief are not disappointed. Monday's Sun furnishes the document. In a long article appearing on the editorial page Mr. Hazen gets off one of his characteristic wallings, a beautifully worded essay, full of indignation, yet giving no comfort to either party.

The facts are that Mr. Hazen thinks he can make some political capital out of the Simms case, that he can annoy the Solicitor General by publishing articles similar to those the Sun has been printing and that he may profit politically by keeping up the agitation. We may expect him to make extended reference to poor Mr. Simms at the opening of the house. It is truly piteous to witness the indignation of Mr. Hazen and his local henchmen. They are taking a great interest in Mr. Simms. In the Sun Mr. Hazen suggests that the Solicitor General resign his seat. It that event would we find Mr. Simms the regularly chosen opposition nominee? We doubt it. The Solicitor General was regularly elected. He is in, and it is up to the Opposition to get him out if they can but in their hearts they know his right to the seat is undoubted, no matter what they may say for political effect. In two or three years we venture the assertion that the opposition party in this county will have on their hands the political corpses of Messrs Smith and Fleming. They will get all the chance to fight that they are able to attend to. Mr. Hazen would do better to stick to his law practice. He will never be a premier unless he changes his ways.

Before Squire Farley at Bristol on Thursday of last week one Geo. W. Dickinson who claims Littleton Me. as his home, was brought up on the charge of obtaining money under false pretences. He had been collecting money in this county for "a poor woman who had her buildings burned." Deputy Sheriff Foster arrested the man. Justice Farley committed him for trial at the next county court, which will open on the 14th inst.
