A fire broke out in the hay loft of a barn owned by James Campbell situated near the rear of Montgomery's store on Saturday last 10.30 a. m., and made considerable progress before discovered. The hose company was soon upon the ground and with able assistance rendered by the citizens with a good supply of water soon gained control of the flames. A rough estimate places the damage at \$100. Fortunately the morning was calm; had there been a strong west wind a row of many wooden would have been destroyed. The cause of the fire remains a mystery.

Next to her family the church of which she was an earnest worker will miss her the most. She was in her 68th year. Funeral was held on Monday at 3 p. m. conducted by Rev S A Baker, short service at the home thence to the Reformed Baptist Church of which she was a member where a sermon was preached by the pastor, appropriate to the occasion. The house was crowded to its utmost standing capacity. The procession then made its way to the cemetery on the hill where her body was laid to rest until the trumpet sounds for her resurrection to life eternal. "Blessed are the dead who die in the Lord."

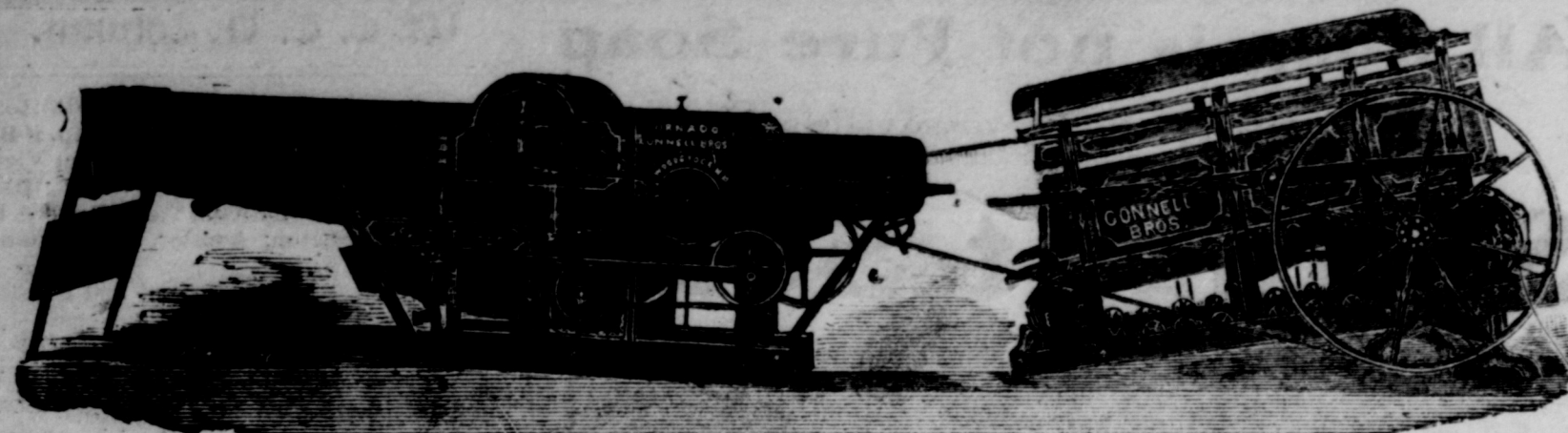
Rev John Perry and wife have moved into a building owned by J T G Carr on the east of railway track.
