


TRADE RETURNS.

The total trade of Canada, as shown by statistics prepared by the Customs Department, for the year ending June 30 last, has increased a quarter of a million dollars. The trade of the country is now double what it was in 1896. There was a falling off during the past year of over eight millions in domestic exports, and about two millions in foreign exports, as well as a reduc-tion of about three-quarters of a million in coin and bullion, but this was a little more than made up for in

consumption. It is noticed that the export of domestic manufactures for last year was \$1,250,000 in excess of the provious year. The produce of the mine showed a decrease of about one million and a half dollars, and agriculture of about eight millions. The total aggregate trade of the Dominion, on the basis of imports for consumption and domestic exports, was \$465,228,307, compared with \$464,981,972 for 1904, or an increase of about a quarter of million dollars. "The man who has never stood up-on the tee with a sturdy rival hear him and driven a perfect ball, the hands having followed well through and finished nicely up against the head, while the little white meets in the distance, after skimming the earth for a time now rises and sears upward, clearing all obstacles, and seeming to revel in its freedom and speed until at last it dips gracefully back to earth again—I say that the man who has not done this thing has missed one of the joys of life. "There are two mistakes to which the beginner is much addicted, and to them is due the unhappy circum-

to them is due the unhappy circumstance that in so many cases he never gets his club handicap down never gets his club handicap down to single figures. My earnest advice to the biginner is to undergo the slow process of tuition for nothing less than three months, and prefer-ably more. It is a very long time I know, and it may seem painfully tedious work, simply knocking a ball backward and forward for all those months, but if he does not accent my backward and forward for all those months, but if he does not accept my suggestion he will have harder things to try his patience during many years afterwards, while, if he takes my advice, he may be down very near to scratch at the end of the first year, and he will be very thankful that he spent the period of probation as he did. "A golfer's swing is often made for good or ill in the first week of his experience. His first two days of practice may be of the greatest im-portance in fashioning his style. If, when he takes his first few swings, he

when he takes his first lesson or two and makes his first few swings, he has a bail on the ground before him which he is trying to hit, all his thoughts will be concentrated on what appears to him to be the neces-sity of hitting it—hitting it at any cost. But if he has no ball before him he will surely learn to swing his club in exactly the way in which it ought to be swung. His whole mind will be concentrated upon getting every detail of the action properly regulated and fixed according to the advice of his tutor, and by the time

the foxes' coats are ruddy and perfect. The eagles are powerful birds, of such weight that a small wooden support is carried by the eagle bearer. A well grown bird of more than usually flerce temperament will occasionally kill a wolf. Directly any game is seen the birds make their flight and swoop down with great precision.

"One of these birds has to my knowledge," writes our correspondent, "killed seventeen foxes in six weeks. I can vouch for this killing of foxes by eagles, for I personally took photographs and saw the whole sport from beginning to end.

"Years ago I wrote a letter to the Field, telling how foxes swarm up small pine trees in Florida when a 'kill' appears imminent. I have frequently seen them do so, but I was politely told what an Ananias I must be."-London Sphere.




