### KINGARTH MYSTERY.

Identity of the Woman Found  
Dead in Booms Established.

The adjourned inquest which was  
convened to establish the identity of  
the unfortunate woman found in  
Kingarth booms on June 13th, 1905  
and also if possible to ascertain the  
means by which she came to her  
death, was concluded on Saturday  
afternoon at the office of Clerk H. B.  
Rainsford in the County Court House.

The evidence of Albion R. Foster,  
Deputy Sheriff of Carleton County  
was given.

The other witness called was  
Daniel Albert Wort, who testified  
that he was engineer in the water  
works department, residing in Wood-  
stock. He said his mother was Mrs.  
William Hussey, aged 60 years. She  
had her ears pierced for earrings and  
also had a set of false teeth, which  
witness thought were made by Dr.  
Camber. He had not talked with her  
since last summer but had heard that  
she was in Woodstock last winter.

Mr. Wells told him he had bought  
the property from his mother. Wit-  
ness had never seen anything in the  
papers about a woman being found  
drowned nor did he hear anything  
about the matter until a week ago  
Sunday. He thought his mother was  
in Houlton. He should say from the  
description given that deceased was  
his mother. Witness always thought  
her to be of sound mind. She was  
fretful but he never heard her men-  
tion suicide. Mr. Wort said that his  
brother Harry told him he had seen  
his mother on Good Friday and she  
seemed much upset. She told him  
Wells had bought the property and  
was going to turn her out. His wife  
also told him that his mother and  
Wells did not get along well. Witness  
did not think that his mother would  
commit suicide.

After Mr. Wort's evidence had been  
taken the jury retired and returned  
shortly with the following verdict:

That the body of the woman found  
in the river St. John at Kingarth in  
the Parish of Kingsclear, County of  
York, on June 15th, 1905, was the  
remains of Mrs. William Hussey,  
Woodstock, Carleton Co., who was  
last seen alive on April 22, 1905.

And we believe deceased came to  
her death by drowning, whether  
accidental, suicidal or through the  
agency of another we are unable to  
say.

And that we feel a great deal of  
credit is due to the coroner for his  
untiring efforts to establish the  
identity of the unfortunate woman.

Rev Mr Hartley Describes  
The Assault.

In the police court at Fredericton  
Monday morning Mr Hartley stated  
that he resided in Houlton being a  
minister of the Free Baptist church  
at that place. On being asked to  
tell what took place on the night of  
the assault, Friday, July 21st, wit-  
ness stated that on that evening  
he was descending Maryland Hill  
about 9.35 o'clock, walking and alone.  
He was about opposite the middle  
gate leading to Mr Randolph's resi-  
dence, when he observed three per-  
sons standing under the shadow of  
the trees by the left hand side of the  
road coming down. As he came op-  
posite the crossing, one of the three  
stepping out said to witness, "Have  
you a match?" He stopped and part-  
ly turned round to reply, but before  
he could speak the one who asked  
the question struck him a blow on  
the mouth. Just afterwards, while  
his head was turned some other per-  
son struck him on the neck under the  
right jaw. That blow knocked  
witness down. He presumed the  
blow came from one of the three  
before noticed, because he saw no  
one else on the hill. Before witness  
could recover himself and get up  
from the ground he received a good  
many blows about the face and body.  
Most of the blows were with the fists  
but witness swore that he also  
thought he got kicked in the side  
and arms. Being on the ground with  
his face down he could not, however,  
positively say that he had been  
kicked. Before he fell there were at  
least two persons engaged in assault-  
ing him. As soon as he was able, he  
covered his face with his hands and  
said, "For God's sake, boys, stop, or  
you'll have me killed."

Just after he spoke one of the three  
said, "Let him go; he's had enough."  
Witness could not state positively  
which of the three made this remark.  
The Rev. gentleman then got upon  
his feet and turning round to look he  
saw his three assailants walking up  
on the left side of the road, Mr  
Hartley himself being near the gutter  
on the right side. The men had not  
yet reached the fence when he saw  
them. Witness then descended the  
hill and came out Regent street, and  
up to the post office, where he was  
staying. He saw no other persons  
on the hill after the assault or until  
he reached Mr Palmer's Corner. Mr  
Hartley had his face covered with  
his handkerchief. As he was coming  
down the hill before the time of the  
assault he met a team opposite the  
upper gate of Mr Randolph's prop-  
erty containing a man and a woman.  
There was also a man and a woman  
beside it. The team was standing  
still at the time.

These people were not more than  
twenty five yards from the place of  
assault, but none of them spoke to  
witness at the time of assault nor did  
he see them again, although in his  
estimation they were within hearing  
distance of the assault.

Mr Hartley got home, as far as the  
post office, without assistance. He  
there fell up against the corner of the  
building as he was going round. Just  
at this time he met Mr Yerxa, who  
was coming out and he helped him  
upstairs. Witness was confined to  
his bed constantly for four days, and  
most of the time for a week, being  
under the medical care of Dr Van-  
wart. As a result of the assault, he  
had a pair of black eyes, bruises on  
both sides of his head, and a badly  
cut mouth.

The severest blow was the second  
one he received on the side of the  
neck. This blow was given from be-  
hind. He also had one rib broken, a  
very bad bruise on his left arm, and  
a number of bruises on one leg. He  
also experienced a great nervous  
shock from the assault. Witness did  
not think that the large bruise on his  
leg could have been inflicted with  
the fist.

### Whitney Takes No Chances.

The premier of Ontario was re-  
cently asked if he had heard the ru-  
mor that the Opposition at Ottawa  
had agreed to a salary of \$7,000 for  
their leader, with the hope of there-  
by inducing the Premier of Ontario  
to enter Federal politics as head of  
the Conservative party. Mr Whitney  
answered that no such sum would be  
an inducement to him. He had no  
intention of entering Dominion poli-  
tics; first, because he would be out  
of place at Ottawa; and secondly,  
because the Conservatives had the  
best man available for the leader-  
ship. Discussing further the question  
of salary for the leader of an Op-  
position, Mr Whitney said that it  
rested largely on how it would work  
out. It was a distinct change, but  
every change had to be made with-  
out a precedent. Canada was dif-  
ferent from England, inasmuch as  
there were few wealthy men here  
who could enter politics independ-  
ently of remuneration. Mr Whitney  
is evidently wise in his generation.  
He had a long uphill row to hoe  
before getting to the top in his own  
province. Now that he is enjoying  
the sweets of office so dearly won,  
he seems in no mood to abandon  
them. Mr Borden is doing very well,  
but is poorly supported. It is very  
clear that his own party is not a unit  
in his favor. Probably no person  
could be obtained who would be  
likely to do any better.
