The Bank of Montreal.

At the last session of parliament the Bank of Montreal got authority to create an honorary president. At the next annual meeting, in all probability, Lord Strathcona will retire from the presidency and will take the honorary title. Sir George Drummond, now vice president, will likely become president. This will leave an opportunity for promotions. Mr. Clouston, general manager, will be made vice-president, and other promotions and changes will result. There are many rumors more or less definite. One of these rumors associates the name of Mr. Stavert, now manager of the Bank of New Brunswick, with an inspectorship at a salary of \$15,000 a year. There are some who think Mr. Stavert is to succeed Mr. MacNider (who is said to be booked for promotion in some form, or perhaps, honorable retirement), as general inspector; others believe that there is to be an inspector appointed for the Maritime Provinces, with residence at either St. John or Halifax, and that Mr. Stavert is to have this position. It will probably be found that the latter speculation is the correct one. Indeed, there are reports more or less definite that there are to be two or three divisional inspectors, who are to be independent in their divisions, such a course being necessary owing to the great increase of the business of the bank, and the certainty that it will increase still more by the large expenditure of money which will be necessitated by the railway construction already commenced. It is pretty certain, however, that Mr. Stavert goes to a lucrative and responsible post.—Globe.

The University Staff Complete.

The senate of the University of New Brunswick appears to have been fortunate in securing a strong man and a fine scholar for the chair of English and Modern Language. Professor Geoghegan comes to this province with a fine record as a student, and some considerable experience as a teacher. He has pursued in Germany and France his studies in the language and literature of those countries, and has won high distinction by his work in English language and literature at Trinity College. The new professor is not the first head of the English and Modern Language department whom the University has obtained from Trinity College. In Professor Stockley, the provincial college received a distinguished scholar, an enthusiastic teacher, and untiring worker, and an accomplished man of letters.

Rates Too High.

Quebec, Sept. 19.—The business before the Manufacturers' Association to-day consisted principally of discussions on insurance and express questions. As regards insurance, it was felt that the rates charged were in many cases far too high, and that relief is necessary. No resolution was adopted, but the suggestion was made that the insurance branch of the association should be converted into a large brokerage office, which would place the insurance of members. As to the express, the complaint was that the rates were too high, and the proposal that parliament should be asked to place express companies and their rates under control of the railway commission, appeared to meet with much favor, though no definite action was taken.
