**The School Clauses.****An Able Resume from The Halifax Chronicle.**

The outcome of the division on the Northwest Autonomy Bill though fully anticipated, and therefore surprising to no one, is highly suggestive in its details.

Only fifty-eight Conservatives and one independent Liberal, Mr. McCarthy—for whose action there are special reasons—voted for Mr. Borden's amendment. There was only one Conservative absent.

One hundred and forty votes were cast against the amendment of which thirteen were Conservative. This perpetual reappearance of the number 13 in connection with the thirteen-lettered name of Robert L. Borden must be peculiarly significant, not to say discouraging to that gentleman's political friends as well as himself.

There were four "pairs"; six absentees; four vacant seats and the Speaker. The majority on the actual count was 81. But, of the absentees, five were Liberals and the vacant seats are all Liberal; so that in a full House the Government majority would have been 89, or, with the Speaker, 90.

That is to say, a full array of Members would have lined up 149 against and only 59 for Mr. Borden's proposition; 149 for, and only 59 against the Government's measure.

There was a majority of 21 for the Bills, exclusive of Quebec. And if every Roman Catholic in the House had abstained from voting there would still have been a substantial Protestant majority for the Bills.

There is no getting over these facts. There can be no wriggling around them. They can neither be answered nor evaded. They express the deliberate conviction of all Canada that the Government has not only done the very best that it could with the Northwest school situation but that its solution of the difficulty is fair and acceptable to all but extreme and irreconcilable partisans.

We doubt if there is an intelligent elector in Canada, Conservative or Liberal, who has fully informed himself of all the facts and circumstances of the case who is not, in his heart whatever he may utter with his lips, of this opinion.

The situation was not one to be disposed of by the laying down of hard and fast theoretical lines of any sort. It was an actual and acute situation which had to be faced directly and disposed of practically.

A separate school Act for the Northwest had been on the Dominion Statute Book since 1875. It was placed there by the unanimous action of Parliament. The parties were equally responsible for it. A similar law had been enacted five years before for the Province of Manitoba under Sir John Macdonald's first Administration. A schools system had been established thereunder by the representative Government of the Territories themselves, with which the people of the Northwest were fully content. No one up to this moment has a word to say against it.

That system provides for schools as free from clerical or denominational or denominational, during or

inary class hours, as any in existence in any Province of the Dominion. The so-called separate schools under it merely have the privilege of giving religious instruction, to such pupils as may elect to remain, for half an hour daily after the close of school work.

To have abolished that small and absolutely harmless if not actually beneficial privilege it would have been necessary for the Government, before introducing their Autonomy measure, to have brought down a Bill repealing the Act of 1875, unanimously passed, and in modified force for over thirty years. By doing this they would have overturned the whole Northwest school system, thrown the educational affairs of the new Provinces into hopeless confusion at the outset, and opened wide the doors to dangerous contention and costly as well as irritating litigation.

But is it conceivable, in the light of the vote recorded on Wednesday, that the Government could have induced the House to pass such a Bill? Unquestionably it is not. The opposition would have been up in wild arms against it. They would have had the solid Roman Catholic vote with them. And thus the Government would have been condemned and defeated for attempting to pass the very legislation which the opposition is now denouncing them for not introducing. And by introducing it they would richly have deserved such condemnation, for they would have been doing a violent and cruel deed.

Moreover, there is the very best of reason to believe that even could they have got such a Bill passed they would have been as far as ever from settling the question. The Constitution would still have had to be reckoned with; and many of the best lawyers in Canada are of the opinion that the Act of 1875, backed by the B. N. A. Act of 1867, would have compelled the continuance of separate schools in the Northwest in spite of any repeal of the 1875 Act. To settle this question, while at the same time doing absolutely right, legislation continuing the school system established by the people of the Northwest themselves was introduced by the Government, thus removing all possible doubt and chance for future litigation, in so far as they can be removed by concurrent Acts of the Imperial and Canadian Parliaments.

This is what the Government has done, and it has done nothing more. Could it, or, if it could, should it have done less? The people through their representatives in Parliament have spoken in approval of their decision as never before in the history of Canada.

The Opposition is left only as a remnant, and a hopeless one at that. It will take them and their unwilling leader, Mr. Borden, who has been forced into his unenviable present position contrary to his own better judgment, many a long day to recover what they have lost in the respect and confidence of the Dominion.

**Well Known Traveller Dead.**

General regret is felt in this section at news of the death of Samuel Upton, traveller for the Montreal firm of Wm. Ewing & Sons, seed merchants. Mr. Upton was here a few weeks ago and seemed to be in his usual good health. While on his maritime trip he caught a heavy cold. Meningitis set in and an operation was performed at one of the big Montreal hospitals. Temporary relief followed, but the end came quite unexpectedly. He leaves a wife and a small family.
