FIELDING OR MULOCK?

It seems to be taken for granted that Sir Wilfrid Laurier is not greatly in love with the strenuous life one must live when burdened with the premiership. We know Sir Wilfrid is an able leader. We do not think his superior in this respect has ever been known in Canadian affairs. Certainly Sir Charles Tupper or any of Sir Wilfrid's immediate predecessors fail to come near the standard of leadership attained by the present premier. The premiership is a heavy burden particularly to a man of somewhat frail body and indifferent health. The present occupant has received the strongest evidences of popular approval. He knows that the people respect him. He feels that the Liberal party have signally honored him. Now that the party is strong and well entrenched, Sir Wilfrid may feel disposed to rest. Nine out of ten would say if asked off hand to name his successor, "Fielding." Probably they would not be far astray. There is but one rival and he is the knight from North York, Sir William Mulock. The Postmaster General is an able administrator and as honest as the day is long. Like the Finance Minister there cannot a word be said against him either as regards public or private life. Sir William is, moreover, an Ontario member, and that is the province above all others where the Liberal party needs strengthening. Ontario is conservative at heart. The people there have given Sir Wilfrid a large measure of support because they respect him personally and admire his good government. Just now Ontario has gone politically crazy over the Autonomy question. If Sir William Mulock were to take the premiership after the session the feeling of unrest might possibly subside, but we do not think Mr Fielding could be passed over. He certainly had it in his power to wreck the administration on the school clauses had he seen fit. The solid contingent behind him is the finest body of representatives Nova Scotia ever sent to the Commons. Hon W S Fielding won the greatest political victory in Nova Scotia's history when last November he drove R L Borden out of Halifax and left not a single seat to the enemy. Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island and Quebec would certainly be almost a unit in his favor. We wish Sir Wilfrid long life and prosperity. We would like to see him continue in the premiership for another decade. If he must retire we shall be sorry but will welcome his successor in the person of the gifted Minister of Finance.

THE CARNIVAL.

The Carnival Organization seems strong and should be effective. Mayor Jones will make a good chairman, Treasurer Creighton has been a splendid official in the past, and the new secretary, Mr Malaney, is thoroughly competent and willing to discharge the duties under his care. The committees are composed of workers. Jos Fewer, C L Smith, G E Balmann, W B Nicholson, E R Teed, T V Monahan, J S Eagles, A G Bailey and Dr Hand are on the Finance Committee. These gentlemen will soon call upon subscribers. We trust the merchants and others will treat them generously and kindly.

EDITORIAL NOTES.

W W B McInnes M P of British Columbia is an applicant for the position as governor of the Yukon. The salary is \$12,000 per year.

The Moncton Times is anxious to learn the nature of the position which we hinted Hon Clifford Sifton might take in the future. The Times will do well to keep an ear to the ground.

A B Aylesworth the noted Toronto lawyer who was a member of the Alaskan Boundary Commission is mentioned as likely to run for North Oxford, Ontario, in succession to the late Hon James Sutherland.

Hon Charles Hyman told a correspondent at Ottawa the other day that if honored with a portfolio he certainly would run again for his old seat, London, Ont. At the general election he had only 23 majority, and the opposition have been spreading a report that he dare not contest London again.

The Montreal Daily Star, which is showing evidence of a sane course in political affairs, justly rebukes the indecent haste displayed by W F McLean M P of the Toronto World in asking the premier on Monday if the vacancy in the cabinet caused by Mr Sutherland's death had been filled. The Star is opposed to the Ontario firebrands who are trying to set creed against creed and break up the harmony existing in Canada. The Star used to be a fanatic itself. It has seen the error of its ways.

Successful Carleton County Young Man.

Carleton County has sent out many bright and deserving sons into the great world, most of whom have done honor to themselves and the country that claims them. Perry B Perkins is one of these bright young men. He was born at Centreville in the year 1877. His elementary education was obtained in the Superior School at that village. In 1895 he graduated from the Fredericton Normal School with a first class teacher's license. During the next four years he taught different schools in the province. In 1899 he entered the University of New Brunswick winning the Asa Dow Scholarship worth \$150 in a competitive examination. The following year he was given a superior school license. Twelve months later he secured a diploma entitling him to teach in the High Schools. In 1902 Mr Perkins received his B A degree with honors in Mathematics and Physics, and distinction in Economics, also winning the Governor General's gold medal for best work in physics. Harvard College gave him a \$150 scholarship that fall, and from this historic university he received the Bachelor's degree in 1903. Yale was so well pleased with his record that he was attracted to that centre by the offer of free tuition. He was there given the A M degree in 1904 in the Physics Department. Since that time Mr Perkins has been principal of Leland and Grey Seminary, located at Townshend, Vermont. This young man is certainly one of the brightest the county has ever produced. The SENTINEL feels that he will reach a very high place in his profession. His sturdy manhood and noble christian character along with educational attainments of a high degree combine to give this talented young Canadian advantages of a high order.

Diamond Merchants in Town.

Two quiet and ordinary looking travellers arrived in town Tuesday night and registered at the Carlisle Hotel. They were Adolph and Jake Levy, members of the firm of Levy Bros, one of the largest diamond houses on the continent. The pair had a little valise about two feet long and less than a foot high. Outwardly there was nothing to distinguish it from any other of its kind,

but inwardly there was a sight fit for a king. No less than One Hundred Thousand Dollars worth of the finest sparkling diamonds was contained in the grip. It is no wonder the pair never let the precious package out of their sight. Even at meal time it always occupies a place of honor at the table. Parties who are in the market for diamonds will be sorry to learn that they are gradually soaring higher in price. Last year they advanced nearly forty per cent. Wednesday afternoon Hon W. P. Jones was served with a summons calling upon him to show cause why a date should not be fixed for the trial of the petition against his return as member of Carleton. As the Solicitor General is willing to fight the case to a finish without any delay no objection will be offered on his part to the naming of a day for trial. On Thursday next before Judge Barker at St John application will be made on behalf of Mr Simms to have the case come to trial. It is probable that the learned judge will name a date in June. The trial will be held here.
