

Revolving Bed Surface Planer.

SPECIALLY ADAPTED FOR SURFACING GREEN, ICY, WET OR THICK LUMBER.

The above cut represents our **REVOLVING BED PLANER**, with Straight Feed Belt. It planes 24 inches wide and from 1-16 to 8 inches thick. The Cylinder is solid forged steel, with two knives, and the bearings run in self oiling long journals. The rolls are weighted at each end. The bed is raised or lowered, to suit thickness of lumber, by power. It has two speeds for feeding and all latest improvements. Pulleys on Cylinders are 5 in. diameter by 5 1/2 in. face, and should run at about 3,000 or 3,500 revolutions per minute. Counter Shaft with fast and loose Pulleys: fast Pulley 12x6 1/2 and loose Pulley 10x6 1/2, with a flange, so that belt will be loose when not in operation, and two 24 in. Pulleys, 5 in. face, the shaft making 625 revolutions per minute. For further particulars apply to

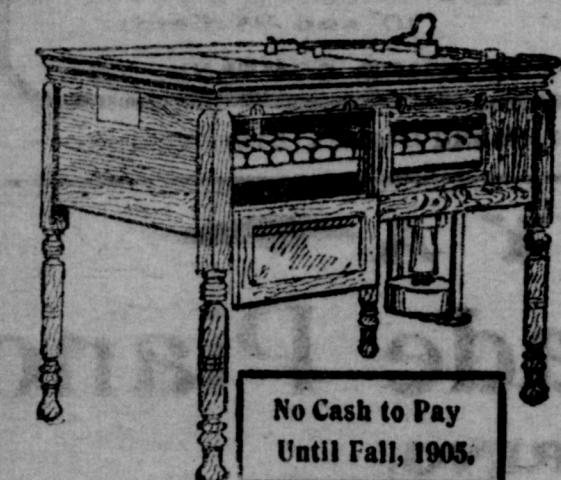
