## The Brooklyn Bridge.

Electricity says that the Brooklyn bridge is now reaching a period in its history when the paramount question of danger overrides all other considerations, and the structure must be rebuilt to insure public confidence and safety. Its rate of deterioration has been \$1,000,000 a year, which the engineering experts have attributed to overstrain and electrolysis. Overstrain perhaps was to have been expected of the only direct connecting link between the two great cities, but electrolysis as a cause of destruction of so noble a structure represents a certain knowing heedlessness on the part of trolley companies, whose experiences should have called for some provision on their part against such disastrous consequences. The Journal thinks that better means ought to be taken to prevent similar destruction of the new bridge farther up the river.

## NEW BRUNSWICK LIVE STOCK CONDITIONS.

By the census of 1901, the domestic live stock of the province was made up of 61,789 horses with an average of \$98.17 each; 111,084 milch cows averaging in value \$30.68 each; 118,110 other horned cattle, average value \$10.07 each; 51,765 swine worth per head \$7.77 and 192,524 sheep worth \$2.85. The total value of all the domestic animals kept on New Brunswick farms was that year \$9,740,309.

What were the returns for the investment? The statistics show as follows:—

Dairy Products, both Factory and home made.....	\$2,280,427
Live Stock sold.....	757,976
Meats and products of all animals killed on the farm.....	1,100,793
Wool.....	145,046

What did it cost to feed these animals for a year? If the following figures for each class of animal are correct the total cost would far exceed the returns, viz.

The cost for one year's keep, Horse \$25, Milch cows \$17, Other Cattle \$10, Swine \$6.30 and Sheep \$4. This totals \$5,298,508.

Of course the labor which the horse performs can be to a large extent placed against his cost of food.

How to make this live stock more profitable should be an interesting topic for discussion among our people.

To stimulate this discussion and to give practical information the Farmers and Dairywomen's Association with the assistance of the Dominion and Local Departments of Agriculture will hold a series of meetings which will be addressed by expert stockmen.

The meetings will be held at Andover, June 14th; Woodstock, June 16th; Jemseg, June 19th; Pettitcodiac, June 21st and Chatham, June 23rd.

Messrs Duncan Anderson of Rugby, Ont. and W F Stephen of Huntingdon, Que. will be the speakers and they will take specimen animals before their audiences for discussion. Heavy horses and beef and dairy cattle will be the classes discussed.

Japan's Great Naval Victory.

We fear many years, if not generations, will come and go before the whole civilized world cease speaking of Japan's recent great naval victory. It may be said that with one, or possibly two, exceptions all nations rejoice over it, and will continue to speak of it long after Japan and Russia have again become friends. The cause of the general rejoicing is evident—Japanese interest is parallel to that of the world, and at present whatever advances the one helps the other. Certain of our contemporaries here indulge in some unworthy, envious remarks regarding Japan's future influence in Asia, and the possibility of its attempting a conquest of the Philippines. If it be the dread of that which is inducing President Roosevelt to urge this country not to rest until it has "the largest navy in the world," we think he may at once abandon any such fear, for so far as can be seen neither Japan, nor any other country, would take that white elephant of this country's hands in a gift. Some other excuse must be found for that huge political job in shipbuilding.—Exchange.

Chicago's Canal Drainage.

Already Chicago is beginning to derive benefit from its drainage canal. The health of its inhabitants is greatly improved. During the week ending May 20th there was only one death in the city from typhoid fever, a record without a parallel in that city in recent years, and probably without a duplicate in any other large city of the world. This excellent showing, moreover, was made before the full completion of its intercepting sewer system, by means of which all the sewage of the city will be diverted from the lake, and the city's water supply will then be as pure as the authorities can make it.

The result of his great ocean yacht race should encourage those who have steadfastly maintained that our amateur designers, Duggan and Sherwood, could design a successful America's cup boat. The most important feature of the race was the fact that a schooner of up to date model won and broke three records. Breaking records is of more significance than winning the race, because a race may be won by the misfortune of an opponent, while the breaking of all records can be accomplished only by the merit of the winner.

## Norway Has No King.

Copenhagen, June 19.—All hope that King Oscar or Crown Prince Gustav, will yet yield to the request of the Norwegian Storting to place a prince of the house of Bernadotte on the throne of Norway has now disappeared, according to a high authority.

Patriot Must Die.

The Court of Appeals has sustained the lower courts in adjudging Albert T Patrick, the New York lawyer, guilty of murder, first degree, in causing the death of William Marsh Rice. On April 7, 1902, Patrick was convicted on an indictment charging him with the murder of Rice by chloroform and mercury, administered to him during his sickness on Sept 23, 1900.

The case reached the Court of Appeals on March 14 of this year, when David B Hill, who appeared for the appellant, based his argument for a reversal mainly on the contention that the condition of Rice's body revealed by the post-mortem examination, might have been caused by fluids used in embalming. The prevailing opinion is by Judge Gray, with whom concur Judges Bartlett, Haight and Werner. There is a dissenting opinion by Judge O'Brien, Chief Judge Cullen and Judge Vann concurring.
