A Quarter of a Million Miles of Railway Traffic Free of Charge.

The generous concessions which are made to the Bible Society by the Government and private railways in Russia can show no equal in any other country. The number of railway miles put at the Society's disposal in the Empire of the Czar, without charge of travelling or freight, amounts to not less than a quarter of a million a year. As an instance of Bible traffic in Russia, on August 14th consignment of Scripture were despatched from the Bible Society's Depot in St. Petersburg to be carried 1,000 miles, while the week before the consignments despatched were to be carried 5,200 miles; and this represents the output from St. Petersburg alone, without taking into consideration the Society's other depots in various parts of Russia and Siberia. Concessions such as these are a valuable contribution to the Society's working expenses.

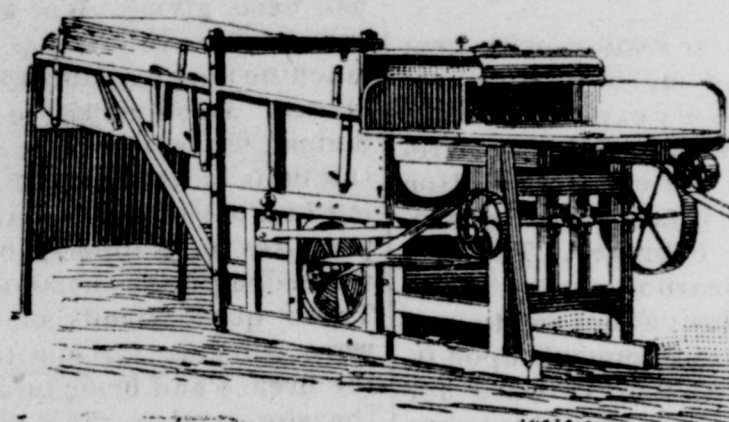

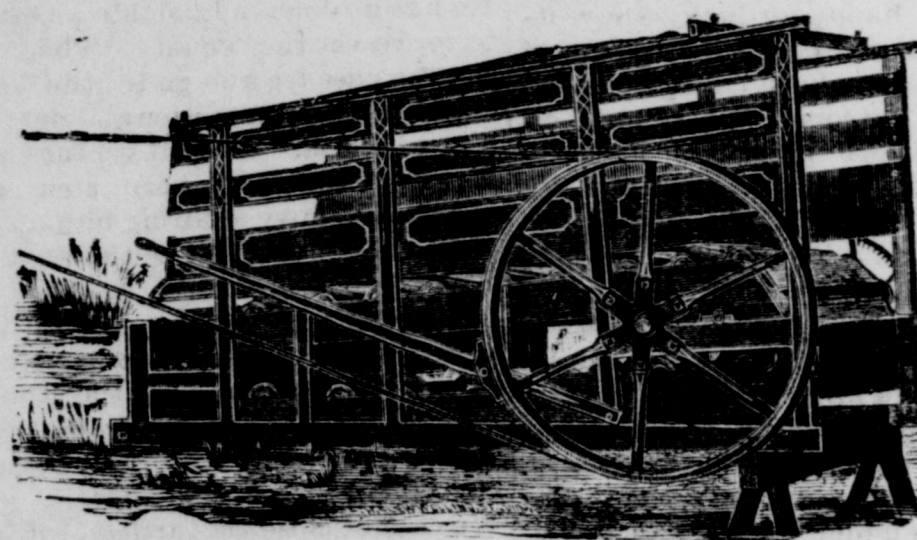
