THE ELECTION OF County Councillors COUNTY OF CARLETON.

The Election of County Councillors will be held on **TUESDAY, the TENTH DAY OF OCTOBER NEXT.**

FIFTEEN days public notice of the time and place of holding election to be given by Parish Clerks by posting in three of the most public places of the Parish. Nomination of candidates to be filed with the Parish Clerk, or to be left at his residence, at or before six o'clock, p. m., on Monday, the second day of October next.

PARISH CLERKS to post names of candidates in three of the most public places in each Polling District on or before THURSDAY, the FIFTH day of October next.

CANDIDATES names also to be posted up at the Polling place before the opening of poll on day of election.

THE PARISH CLERK or DISTRICT CLERK (as case may be) to act as Chairman, unless he refuses to serve, or is absent, or not competent by reason of relationship of candidate, when chairman to be chosen by electors present.

ASSESSORS are required to furnish Parish Clerks with list of electors.

NOTE that time for holding election has been changed by By-Law of County Council passed at January Session 1901. Formerly under Acts of 1890, Chap. 34, it was the last Tuesday in October, but is now the second Tuesday in October.
