Judge Barker evidently believed the evidence of the Sheriff and his friends, and discounted that of Mr Simms, and the petition was properly dismissed.

Hon Mr Jones has been held up to ridicule and abused by the Tory papers as a man who held his seat through fraudulent means, but the decision of Judge Barker is a complete answer to the charges that have been directed against him, not only in the opposition press, but in the legislature, and his friends heartily congratulate him on the outcome of the trial. No man questions the strict impartiality of Judge Barker, and his decision will be received by fair minded men all over the province as a just and righteous


Fit for realms to rise upon, . . . Of their generation.

And further, the poet has no right, even wilfully obscure, as in the following lines, to give a plural verb to a singular noun:

With no veil before their face Such as shroud or sceptre lend. But as nobody seems to know what it's all about perhaps it doesn't much matter.

Kipling wrote one really genuine bit of poetry. His "Recessional" is one of the noblest things in English verse but most of his later work is, to use a rather inelegant phrase, simply rotten. Kipling, if he values his reputation, should write tion as a public man, as a citizen, and no more such meaningless doggerel.





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
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
