### The Canadian North-West.

#### HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS.

Any even numbered section of Dominion  
Lands in Manitoba or the North-west Terri-  
tories, excepting 8 and 26, which has not  
been homesteaded, or reserved to provide  
wood lots for settlers, or for other purposes,  
may be homesteaded upon by any person  
who is the sole head of a family, or any  
male over 18 years of age, to the extent of  
one quarter section of 160 acres, more or  
less.

#### ENTRY.

Entry may be made personally at the  
local land office for the District in which the  
land to be taken is situated, or if the home-  
steader desires he may, on application to the  
Minister of the Interior, Ottawa, the Com-  
missioner of Immigration, Winnipeg, or  
the Local Agent for the District in which  
the land is situated, receive authority for  
some to make entry for him. A fee of \$10  
is charged for a homestead entry.

#### HOMESTEAD DUTIES.

A settler who has been granted an entry  
for a homestead is required by the provi-  
sions of the Dominion Lands Act, and the  
amendments thereto, to perform the condi-  
tions connected therewith, under one of the  
following plans:—

(1) At least six months' residence upon  
and cultivation of the land in each year  
during the term of three years. It is the  
practice of the Department to require a  
settler to bring 15 acres under cultivation,  
but if he prefers he may substitute stock;  
and 20 head of cattle, to be actually his  
own property, with buildings for their ac-  
commodation, will be accepted instead of  
the cultivation.

(2) If the father (or mother, if the father  
is deceased), of any person who is eligible  
to make a homestead entry under the pro-  
visions of this Act, resided upon a farm in  
the vicinity of the land entered for by such  
person as a homestead, the requirements of  
this Act as to residence prior to obtaining  
patent may be satisfied by each person re-  
siding with the father or mother.

(3) If a settler was entitled to and has  
obtained entry for a second homestead, the  
requirements of this Act as to residence  
prior to obtaining patent may be satisfied  
by residence upon the first homestead, if  
the second homestead is in the vicinity of  
the first homestead.

(4) If the settler has permanent resi-  
dence upon farming land owned by him in  
the vicinity of his homestead, the require-  
ments of this Act as to residence may be  
satisfied by residence upon the said land.  
The term "vicinity" used above is meant  
to indicate the same township, or an ad-  
joining or cornering township.

A settler who avails himself of the pro-  
visions of Clauses (2), (3) or (4) must culti-  
vate 30 acres of his homestead, or substitute  
20 head of stock, with buildings for their  
accommodation, and have besides 80 acres  
substantially fenced.

The privilege of a second entry is re-  
stricted by law to those settlers only who  
completed the duties upon their first home-  
steads to entitle them to patent on or before  
the 2nd June, 1882.

Every homesteader who fails to comply  
with the requirements of the homestead  
law is liable to have his entry cancelled,  
and the land may be again thrown open for  
entry.

#### APPLICATION FOR PATENT.

Should be made at the end of three years,  
before the Local Agent, Sub-Agent or the  
Homestead Inspector. Before making ap-  
plication for patent, the settler must give  
six months' notice in writing to the Com-  
missioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of  
his intention to do so.

#### INFORMATION.

Newly arrived immigrants will receive,  
at the Immigration Office in Winnipeg, or  
at any Dominion Lands Office in Manitoba  
or the North-west Territories, information  
as to the lands that are open for entry, and  
from the officers in charge free of expense,  
advice and assistance in securing lands to  
suit them. Full information respecting the  
land, timber, coal and mineral laws, as well  
as respecting Dominion Lands in the Rail-  
way Belt in British Columbia, may be ob-  
tained upon application to the Secretary of  
the Department of the Interior, Ottawa; the  
Commissioner of Immigration, Winnipeg;  
Manitoba; or to any of the Dominion Lands  
Agents in Manitoba or the North-west Ter-  
ritories.

#### Poor Mr. Haultain.

There is something truly noble in  
the solicitude just now being dis-  
played for Mr. Haultain. It seems

national calamity were he by any  
set of circumstances to miss becom-  
ing Premier of one of the new pro-  
vinces. The Liberal Government at  
Ottawa is being told in tearful num-  
bers that things must be fixed so  
Haultain can keep his job, or at  
least, like King Oscar, half of it, at  
the same pay.

But why in the name of common-  
sense should the Liberals at Ottawa  
sit up nights, figuring how they can  
save Mr. Haultain? He starts with  
a long advantage over any other  
man, for he has had the eyes of the  
West on him for years. Conserva-  
tives and Liberals have made it easy  
for him in the past, and he has re-  
paid that treatment by taking sides  
with the Conservatives and against  
the Liberals whenever a suitable oc-  
casion offered. He has just been do-  
ing his best to get the Liberals in  
trouble at London and Oxford. He  
has not held back his hand when de-  
livering his blows. He is still threat-  
ening to make inoperative the meas-  
ure the Liberals at Ottawa are put-  
ting through. Must the Liberals  
kiss the hand that smites them? If  
they do they are fools for their pains.  
Mr. Haultain may get control of one  
of the new legislatures if he can.  
His friends evidently fear he can-  
not. But let him try, at least. As a  
result of his own and other Conser-  
vative obstruction, he will have  
three months more of power than he  
is entitled to. Let him be satisfied  
with that, and fight for the rest like  
a man if he wants it.—Exchange.
