Canada's Greatest Bank.

On Monday, July 3rd, the Bank of Montreal will take over the business of the Peoples Bank of Halifax. School Closing Exercises.

The public exercises in connection with the closing of the town schools took place Wednesday evening in the Opera House. The large number present gave striking evidence of the great interest taken in the schools. Chairman H. P. Baird of the Trustee Board occupied the chair in his usual capable manner. Seated upon the platform were the members of the graduating class, Mayor Jones, Trustees Hay, Smith and Belyea, Coun Nicholson, Coun Stevens, Archdeacon Neales, Principal Harrison, Inspector Meagher, A. C. Calder, ex-Mayor Lindsay and several other prominent local personages. In his opening remarks the chairman referred to the trouble between the trustees and the council. He claimed the body of which he is the head had been grossly misrepresented in the newspapers and in the town council which was no place for irresponsible sleight of hand performers. He made a stirring defence of the trustee board. Inspector Meagher delivered an eloquent address to the graduating class, after which Miss Faye Camber very sweetly sang a solo. The audience insisted upon an encore which was generously given. Roy Watt read his prize essay on "The St. John River." This was followed by a solo given by Mrs. G. G. Hare who was in fine form. A pleasing encore delighted the audience. Mrs. R. E. Holyoke, always a favorite, was heard to splendid advantage in a delightful little song, and graciously acceded to a request for an encore. Miss Eva Newcomb then read the Valedictory, which was a splendidly conceived and appropriate production. The presentation of medals and prizes galore filled in the time until long after eleven o'clock. Some spice was added by the lively passage at arms between the mayor and the chairman, to which Coun Nicholson also contributed his quota. The chief medals and prizes were as follows:—W. M. Neales gold prize for Latin, Eva Newcomb; Lt. Col. D. McLeod Vince prize for Mathematics, Charles J. Jones; Hon. W. P. Jones medal for Mathematics, Amy Sharpe; W. W. Hay medal for History, Mary McManus; W. W. Hay medal for Mathematics, Gertrude McManus; H. V. Dalling medal for History, Gertrude McManus; Lt. Col. Vince prize for Latin, Gertrude McManus. Chairman Baird's handsomely bound copy of Shakespeare for highest standing in High School Entrance examination was won by Miss Marguerita Hanson. Numerous other prizes given by Harry Wilson, Mrs. Cunliffe, Miss Jordan, Mrs. T. A. Lindsay, Miss Hillman, Mrs. Stephenson, Mrs. W. P. Jones, J. A. Lindsay, W. B. Nicholson, Owen Kelly, W. Dappa Smith, J. P. Malaney, E. R. Teed, J. S. Eagles, Allan Smith, J. T. A. Diblee and Dr. Hand were presented to the children in the lower grades. The National Anthem closed the proceedings.

Wednesday morning Magistrate Diblee heard a case for violation of the game law on the information of Special Warden Crabb against Joshua Harrington and Frank McManiman of Cloverdale in which it was alleged that the said defendants shot a cow moose on the 12th day of June near Becagumic Lake. Harrington was present in court represented by T. O. L. Ketchum. After hearing the evidence of George Lindsay, Mrs. Frank McManiman

and Warden Crabb the case was adjourned on motion of Solicitor General Jones until Friday next in order that legal service might be made upon the defendant McManiman.

An exhibition of the enormous strength of a slender piece of Portland cement may be witnessed at the store of C. M. Sherwood, Centreville. This single piece or brickette of what is known to be the best cement on earth measures exactly one inch in diameter. The upper end is suspended from a beam by means of a rope while the lower end is attached to a barrel of flour and a keg of nails by the use of another rope, the inch rod of cement forming the connection. The mate to this slender brickette or connecting link, exactly the same size and shape, supported a weight suspended from it of 40 lbs, breaking at 40 lbs. These same brickettes when made were subjected to moist air the first 24 hours, and submerged in water during the next 7 days. Is not this a severe test in every respect? Mr. Sherwood had a full carload of this cement a few weeks since. He bought it right, freighted it right and is selling it right. There is economy in its use—takes so much more sand.
