## Grand Falls.

A party of Grand Falls young men, composed of ex-Mayor A J Martin, Orrin Davis, Charles Burgess, J J Gallagher, Alban Burgess, Angus McLeod and Alfred Burgess, started for Woodstock yesterday in Davis' gasoline launch. An accident not only prevented the trip, but almost caused the loss of two lives. Within a few miles of town, below the fishing grounds, the propeller struck a sunken log, causing the boat to lurch in such a way as to throw Angus McLeod and A J Martin in the swift and deep water. Martin was almost immediately picked up by the boat, but McLeod, who was unable to

swim, had gone down the third time and was unconscious when rescued by Charles Burgess, who heroically jumped overboard after him. Only after the most energetic and prolonged exertions was McLeod resuscitated. The boat was run ashore and a new propeller blade placed instead of the damaged one, but the almost fatal accident had put a damper on the spirits of the party and instead of completing the journey, the boat was turned around and the return trip to Grand Falls made in safety.—Times.

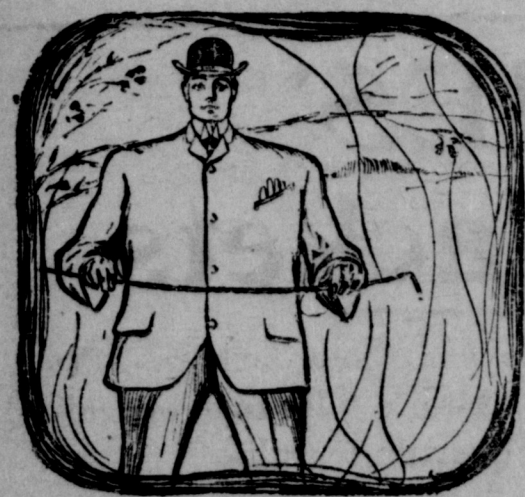

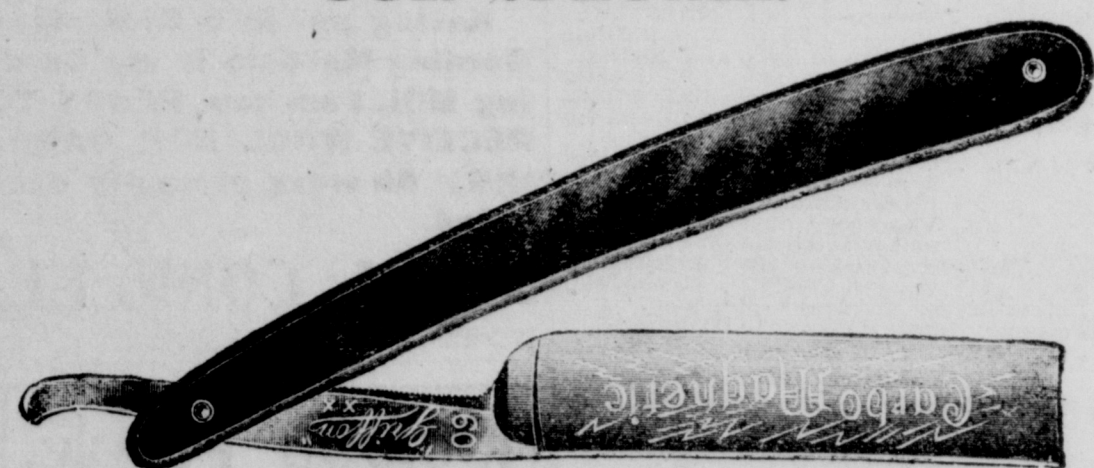

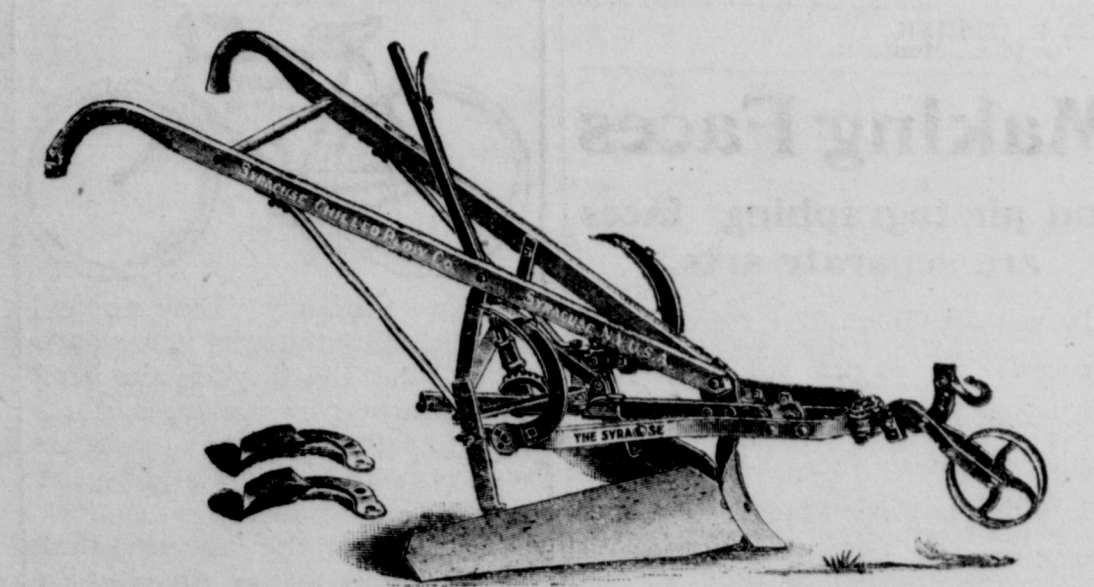
